LITERARY ITEMS.

John Wiley & Son issue the "American Catalogue of Books Published in the United States from January 1861, to January, 1866."

Mr. John Mearns' new book, "The Great Rebellion," a comparative volume to Mr. H. S. Foot's book on the same subject has just been published by the Harpers, who appear to be ambitious to publish the most stupid possible books.

John Stuart Mill, M. P., is busily employed at Avignon, in editing the collected works of H. T. Buckle, the author of "The History of Civilization."

General Count Philippe de Segur, member of the Academy, author of the "Histoire de la Grande Armee," has just completed his "Memoires."

Volume IX of the valuable edition of the "Works of Edmund Burke," issued by Little, Brown & Co., has just made its appearance.

John G. Saxe is engaged in revising his poems for a new edition. Several new poems in the order of sentiment, illustrated by his "Lisette" and "Lovelace," will be added.

Charles H. Swetser has withdrawn from the "Round Table," and leaves it to the hands of Messrs. Gardner and Sedley. In his valedictory he says he "has a natural feeling of pain in thus detaching himself from the Round Table, with whose career he has been associated from its beginning."

The Home Journal thus speaks of Edmund Yates' new novel "Kissing the Rod." "The novel has nothing remarkable about it, either in plot or coloring, and manifests very little true literary genius."

The Chicago Lake Tunnel is nearly finished. The workmen are within thirteen inches of the lake end, and the City Inspector on Saturday morning brood an augur hole through to the other side, nearly showing that what was supposed to be an operation of great delicacy, making the two ends meet, has been accomplished with scientific exactness.

From New Orleans we learn that the Radicals are again attempting to make mischief. The State Executive Committee has tested an address and resolutions denouncing the President as "a traitor and sympathizer with rebels, and an usurper," and calling upon Congress to abolish the present State Government of Louisiana, and to establish a military or provisional one, with the two ends to be the basis. Governor Wells is said to be no party to this movement. There were rumors current at New Orleans of the capture of Matamoros by Cortes, but they were not credited. General Ortega and suite still remain at Brazos. Ortega has again protested against the action of the Federal authorities.
