Any one who has seen the process of evaporation going on at salt works knows that the salt falls to the bottom. Just so it is in the pan where your mackerel or other fish lies with the skin side down, the salt will fall to the skin and remain there; when if placed with flesh side down, the salt falls to the bottom of the pan, and the fish comes out freshened as it should; in the other case it is as salt as when put in.

FIRE ON BOYCE'S WHARF .- Yesterday, at about

eleven o'clock, a fire broke out in the cotton sample room of the office of Messrs. Robert Mure & Co., Beyce's Wharf, and soon spread to the adjoining offices. The offices of Messrs. Shackelford & PRASER, ROBERT MURE & Co., T. S. & T. G. BUDD, HOLMES & STONEY, R. T. WALKER, and the wharf office, were badly damaged. The property, we learned, belonged to Messrs. John Fraser & Co. The flames bid fair at one time to extend to the cotton yard, which, if they had not been prevented by the energy of our fire department, would have consumed a vast amount of cotton and rice. We did not learn that there was any insurance on the property burned. We observed one feature at the fire which we think well worth naming. That was the action of the firemen. Many of them, at the alarm, were at their business, and immediately rushed to the fire, without their proper apparel, causing in a majority of cases the utter ruin of the clothes they were. This shows an appreciation for, and a "loyalty" to, the good institution which they represent, which should be remembered by property holders with gratitude.
