Our Quier Ciry.—The most joyous holidays of the year have passed; and while we look with snazemen: at the records of crime committed in the year have passed; and while we look with sinazemen; at the records of crime committed in some other places during this period, when many allow themselves too free a license for indulgence, we must really congratulate our people on the few excesses which have occurred, and on the general tranquility which has pervaded our city.
