THE CORN BILL.

We have an interesting communication on this subject from a friend in the country, but it is too long for our columns. The writer is very severe on the Legislature. He says, among other things: "Far better would it have been to suspend the whole machinery of government, as long as we are only a State in name, than to have defeated the Corn Bill. For a term during the war we had no courts nor legislatures, and we heard but little complaint of that state of things." He then speaks of the sad condition of the Poor Houses, the Commissioners having to call on private charity to eke out a scanty subsistence for the un-

fortunate inmates. It is a fact that one of the principal causes that impelled Governor ORE last fall to call a special session of the Legislature, was the scarcity of food in many of the central and upper districts of the State. He dwells on this topic with great earnestness in his message. The Corn Bill was considered and passed, and the Commissioner appointed. The conditions annexed being, however, impracticable, the office was declined, and the matter remained in abeyance till the regular session of the Legislature, when several schemes for relief were submitted, but all finally defeated. We hear great complaint in consequence from various sections of the State; and no wonder when we consider that the distress was great enough to induce the Governor to convene the Legislature to devise a messure of relief; and when we are further informed, as was ascertained during the session in Columbia, that there is a great want of corn in a majority of the districts, we cannot be surprised at the interrogatories of our correspondent: "Where were the members from the suffering districts when the decisive vote was taken? Some, perhaps, were too tenacious of their popularity to vote for the Bill, and I feel confident that if there were any such, their constituents, ere this time, have justly condemned such a course. and will not be likely to return them. Or have you ever thought that starvation may soon be knocking at the door of some gallant soldier, who has lost an eye or a limb in the

BIRD'S-EYE VIEW OF THE SUCCESS OF FREE TRADE. Two official papers that have come into our hands two omersal papers that have come into our hands show at a glance some of the most remarkable points in the increase of our commerce and that of France since the inauguration of a free trade policy in England in 1842, and the first cautious stop towards such a policy by the treaty with our neighbors in 1860. THE FOLLOWING ORDINANCE TO RAISE SUPLIES for the year 1867, was ratified at a meeting of Council, held Friday evening, 28th inst., and takes effect from 1st January, 1887:

AN ORDINANCE

TO BAISE SUPPLIES FOR THE YEAR ONE THOUSAND EIGHT HUNDRED AND SITTY-SEVEN, AND FOR OTHER PURESSES.

SECTION 1. 


