CHITMO STATES DISTRICT COURT—Hon. Gro. S. BRYAN presiding Judge.—The Libel case of the United States vs. the schooner Grapeshot was resumed. Mr. CHARLES H. GROYES, Deputy Collector, and Mr. Neur., Dr. EDWARD KREKELEN and Mr. JOSEPHUS WOODRUFF, Custom House Inspec tors, deposed that they were engaged in the seizure, storage and sale of certain segars and rum found on board of the schooner *Grapeshot* in July last. The articles were taken from the forecastle, and it was stated at the time that they belonged to the nen, and the Captain appealed to the Collector to release the goods, as the sailors did not know that they had violated the Revenue Laws. This was not done, and the goods were sold for \$250.

The District Attorney proposed at this stage to introduce George Smith, Captain of the Rebecca Hurst, to substantiate the testimony of Camps. This was objected to by the respondents, and the objection countries of by the respondents. objection sustained by the Judge.

The case was then closed, but the counsel for the defence petitioned Court to be allowed to re-


