Judge DAWKINS, in his charge to the Jury, summed up the evidence and the knotty points advanced to the defence, and explained the different technicalities of the law hich bore upon the case in issue. The Jury having received the indictment, retired to their chamber, and, after an absence of two hours, returned a Scotch whiskey, brandy, &c. verdict of Guilty.

THE FENCE LAW.—It was formerly a statute of this city that all vacant lots should be fonced in; and, although this has not virtually been repealed, yet, in consideration of the poverty and distress now so prevalent, it has never been enforced. This kindness has no doubt been gratefully appreciated by the owners of property in the burnt district, and they have, with few exceptions, availed themselves of it.

It was presumed by the City Council that the Fire Loan Bill, recently passed, would induce the real estate owners to take advantage of its privileges and rebuild, but only a few sections of the city have been, so far, reclaimed from their former waste. The few buildings that have been erected are mostly in the centre of the city, and there is still a dreary extent of ruins that occupies the whole southwestern portion.

During the war the earth was removed from these vacant lots to a considerable depth, and used to construct the different batteries around the city. These are now of no earthly use in their present positions, and, if restored to their former locations, would enhance the value of the property to a great extent, and would lead to future improvements. The city has been engaged in filling up these unsightly holes, as fir as it is possible, but it is a herculean task, and it will be some years before it is completed. In the meantime, these excavated lots are not only an eye-sore, but are positively dangerous to pedestrians. In many places they are dug out up to the pavement, and a false step or a stumble would give the unfortunate individual a downfall of several feet.

These lots are inhabited only by a few cows, who make a precarious living by nibbling the grass and weeds that have sprung into existence on the Read the Certificate of Rev. R. T. ruins. The benefit thus afforded is enjoyed only by the few favored individuals who can afford to keep cows, while the large majority run a daily and nightly risk of breaking their necks, or seriously injuring themselves if they should relax their vigilance. A strong and substantial fence would require but a small outlay on the part of each individual, while the amount of good that would accrue to the public is incalculable.

In the present status of the pavements and the burnt district the greatest care is necessary in order to navigate safely; this is particularly the case on a dark night, for then one can but grope b indly along trusting to his good luck, or else take the mud in the centre of the street. A fence along the sidewak would obviate this difficulty, and, to a great extent, remove the apprehension that is now



The Animal Matter, as might be supposed in a fertilizer so largely derived from fish, is less highly nitrogenized than that in the Peruvian Guano. Still it will afford, during the process of decomposition, about three per cent. of Ammonia. The Oil (which is remarkably abundant)
