The definitive constitution of this office as burg. The definitive constitution of this office as a permanent finance direction is reserved. The second ultase regulates the postal administration of Poland, and subordinates it to the Russian Min-istry of Posts and Telegraphs. The third decree simplifies the general Polish administration. It orders that from the 13th of January, Poland shall

be divided into five instead of ten provincial gov-crnments, and eighty-five districts, and that ofces for the payment of taxes shall be establish ed on that day in the governments and districts according to the new division of the new kingdom. "It also grants fuller powers to the Governors, and orders the formation of local bodies of guards.


