We shall not answer the question in Sir WIL-LIAM JONES' sublime and thrilling lines. They ould be out of place at this day and in this counwould be out of place at this day and in this com-try. We only propose making some observations, and instituting a few comparisons, suggested by the events passing around us. Before the war we thought we had some idea of what were the necessary prerequisites to a Territory becoming a Stat of this Union. Now we must confess our ignorance number of States that at present comprise this Union, whether twenty-six, thirty-six, or thirty-eight. If the "Districts" lately known as the "Re-bel" States are counted there are thirty-six, we believe, in all; and if Nebraska and Colorado are made States, in spite of themselves, and over the President's veto, we shall have thirty-eight. And if so, the President's prediction, contained in his recent veto message, will doubtless be fulfilled, and we shall soon hear of the States of Idaho, Nevada, Dacotah, Washington, Arizona, etc., etc. for the "consent of the governed" appears to be no longer a consideration with our law-makers at Washington. Given the merest Radical foothold in a State or Territory, the faintest hope of electing two Radical Senators and a ditto Representative, and the Territory at once becomes a State, whether a majority of the population of said Ter-ritory desire it or not. If the "nation" must have Territories, why let the "States lately in robellion" occupy that position, at least until they are con verted from the error of their ways, and shall have entirely abjured their late and present political

But let us see how this process of regeneration is brought about, and how it works, after it is fairly in operation. Fortunately we are not without an example. The State of Tennessee affords a nost lamontable illustration. We all remember for history during the war. There, alone of all the States of our late Confederacy, the revolution assumed the form of a civil war. The population of East Tennessee was hostile to the Southern cause, and the bitterest feelings, in many cases the most malignant hatred, were engendered be-tween former friends and neighbors. With the end of the war, there was, unfortunately, not an end to strife. There is to-day no safety in East Tennessee for an ex-Confederate. He has not the shadow of a chance to obtain justice at the courts of the country. This assertion is based upon the testimony of an importial witness. A few weeks ago we republished in THE NEWS along letter from the Knoxville correspondence of the N. Y. Times ffairs in East Tennessee.

We deeply regret that this should be the case, but cannot be surprised at it. With BROWNLOW for Governor, one of the most violent, malignant and unscrupulous political fanatics the world has over known,—four-fifths of the people disfran-chised, and Radical emissaries continually at work to keep up and foment this strife, and Radical subsidies sent there to defray the expenses of such agitation,-the result cannot be otherwise.
