#### CHARLESTON. TUESDAY MORNING, FEBRUARY 12, 1867.

The Joint Congressional Committee on Reconstruction, at the close of last session, brought in a report, recommending the passage of an amendment to the Constitution of the United States. This amendment has since been submitted to the several Legislatures of the Southern States, and was almost unanimosly rejected by every one of them. To punish these States for their obduracy, the same Committee in Cougress, within the last few days, have reported favorably upon a Bill in-troduced by Senator Williams, of Oregon, the main outlines of which we published about two full text of which we gave in our issue of yester day. If this Bill becomes a law, and is not vetoed by the Executive, or set aside by the Judiciary, we shall be brought to taste the bitterness of a despotism equal to the worst forms of Asiatic rule recorded in history. State lines are to be abro-gated, our municipal and State Governments overthrown, our State Constitution and laws will be cowerless to afford us any protection, even the Constitution of the United States will be no barrier to the exercise of this tyranny. It is distinct which are claimed for the meanest, the most ab ject dwellers of the land, are to be deliberately and studiously denied to millions of intelligent, peace-able men, who, themselves and their ancestors, have for ages been in the full and free evereise of all the privileges of enlightened citizenship this is done to subserve the wicked selfishn party purposes. The old adage, "The voice of the people is the supreme law," will have to be changed. Vox satrapea suprema lex will be the future reading.

Events are rapidly culminating to a crisis. Congress,-certainly the more Radical part of it,seems bent on one or another of these destructive Johnson remains President. Indeed, Mr. John rides his vetoes, and has restricted his power, and his more presence "at the other end of the Avecks the wheels of Radical legislation Overruling the Presidential veto is not a finality it still leaves room for objections on constitutiona grounds from the Supreme Court. This tribunal cannot be abolished. It is found necessary to re-organize it, and thus change its political complexion. This, however, cannot be done as long as Johnson is President.

The one great task then before the extreme factionists is the impeachment and removal of the President. This, it is felt, must be compassed at any cost. No stone is left unturned to dragoon the party up to a state of political frenzy, reckless of all consequences. A whole army of scribblers and stump agitators are retained to familiarize the masses with these revolutionary tactics. An organization is said to exist under the name of the Grand Army of the Union, 500,000 strong, the special purpose of which it is to be at hand in case they shall be needed to carry the impeachment. FORMEY'S papers are recognized as the official organs that set the tune, and from them the smaller fry take up the cry. The respectable Re-

publican journals, those which have heretofor been considered as the organs of the party, with singular manimity condemn the whole plan and proceeding. But on the other hand, to compensate for this defection on the part of the faithful, a competent corps of morcenaries has been collisted, at the head of which stands the New York Herald. For nearly two months past this sheet almost daily has had one or two editorial articles, domanding. with earnest solicitude, the impeachment and re-moval of the President. Coupled with this de-mand, says the Boston Post, in a very thoughtful ender on this subject, and as if to cover the tracks of the conspirators, it sweepingly proceeds to show how Congress can declare three-fourths of the States represented to be competent to adopt an amendment to the Constitution; how it may pass a law deposing the Executive while his trial is proseeding; how Gen. GRANT, or some more ductile tion shall be ordered, or Congress shall choose to make a President of its own; how the Supre Court may be abolished by legislation and some thing created in its place to register the edicts of Congress instead of reviewing and deciding upon its laws; and how everything will proceed without a ruffle or a jar; the deposition of the Prosident and the arbitrary appointment of another he effect ed without shaking popular confidence or under-mining the foundations of public credit; the Su-preme Court be abolished by a co-ordinate branch of the Government with no danger whatever to the steady working of our system; and the majority in Congress usurp all the functions of Government of the Governm

congress usury at the functions of Government in the name of the people, though undeniably to the popular wrong and the downfall of the wise and equitable government set up by the Fathers.

There is more "method" in this madness of the Herald than instantly suggests itself. It is in the strict line of its duty, which has always been that of its interest. The single principle which has in-spired the conduct of that paper from the beginspired the conduct of that paper from the beginning of its existence has been, apparently, something very like black-mail. It alternately sided with the Democrats and the Whigs, employing abuse when flattery failed, and always holding out its right hand and its left that so it might at least eatch—something. Its editor made a good part of his living off actors and astronous discontinuous and active of the control of the co his living off actors and actresses, singers and mu-sicians, by making them fear the effects of his journalistic frown. Those who p.id their dollars into its gaping treasury, did so rather to silence its denunciations than because they believed its highdenunciations than because they believed its high-est terms of praise and flattery were of any real service to them. Where everything like principle is become abhorrently venal, fanaticism is sure of finding at ally by simply complying with its terms. These are its favorite instruments, too, because, when the obligations are mutually cancelled, each side is free to treat the other as if there had existed no

free to treat the other as if there had existed no temporary relationship.

Such a prostitution of the responsible office of a public journal is, at a critical juncture like this, as unpardonable affront to the patriotism of all intelligent men, and a disgrace to the party guilty of it. There can be but few who approve a course so fraught with public peril. The deliberate impeachment of the President of the United States seems to call for different treatment by the whole press of the country from that which parry passion and of the country from that which party passion and a paid advocacy suggest. It is a most serious ex-periment to try, whatever such a journal as the New York Herald professes to think about it. Pur-sued for solfish ends alone, as is now proposed, it threatens to culminate in disaster not less wide than a convulsion of all the elements of our repub lican system; involving the final overthrow of con stitutional freedom:
