NAPOLEON'S ADDRESS. In the opening of the session of the Corps Legis latif, the Emperor made his usual speech, which we published on Wednesday. We have already adverted to so much of its contents as related to the Mexican Expedition, in our remarks yesterday on Mexico. The nullity of the treaties of 1815 is again reaffirmed. He says that the great NAPOLEON'S idea is being rapidly fulfilled, uniting all the great it does Philadelphia, whose population is nearly as homogeneous nations hitherto separated, and that thus only could a sure balance of power be made possible. The successes he says, of events in Germany and Italy have paved the way to it, but that these cannot disturb France. "I stood aloof and helped the peace which Prussia and Italy made without dismembering Austria." This much we doubt not is true. But the Emperor deems it unnecessary to say how much more he aimed at, and how greatly he was foiled by the superior sagacity or statecraft of the Prime Minister of Prussia. In fact not a word is said about that demand for a rectification of the frontier on the Rhine, that made such a stir in Europe a few months since; unless we can read it in the following : "France is respected abroad; but the conditions of war being changed, she must increase her defences. The Army Bill has been so drawn as to lighten the burden in times of peace, and to increase the resources in times of war. Our neighbors assume far heavier burdens. Let us keep our flag high, as the best means of preserving peace." This is the gist of the whole speech, and, it is understood, tho Emperor is determined to carry out this military scheme coute qui coute.

In regard to the Eastern question, he simply says that "the great Powers ought to act in concert to satisfy the Christians in the East, protect the rights of the Porte, and prevent complications,"-a consummation devoutly to be wished for, but simply impossible of realization, as it embraces too many incompatible elements.

Of Rome, he says, that the treaty of September has been executed, whereby the government of the Pope has been placed in a new phase, and he is sustained by his own strength and the the veneration of the great Powers for the Head of the Church. Europe will sustain his temporal power against demagogues." Nous verrons! His Majesty next says "the perpetuation of Aus-

tria is necessary to the balance of power." If so, why was Lombardy, and more recently Venetia, wrested from Austria and given to Italy? Is it quite certain that the heterogenous elements that constitute the population of what is at present called Austria, the Germans, Magyars, Czechs, Wends, Sclaves, etc., etc., will not proceed to work out the problem of elective affinity, so well begun a few years ago by a growing segregation of nationalities?

The Emperor next said that he is "certain that A large number of French and Austrian desert- then, why insist on an army of 1,200,000 men? However, we presume, His Majesty's remarks are to be received with limitation—as only meaning that the Exposition, soon to be opened, would be brought to a peaceful and successful close. "Sure of the present, and confident of the

future," he next says. "T have fulfilled your wishes in regard to the development of our institutions upon a liberal scale." This is all that is said in reference to the late decree, "enlarging the liberties" of France, excepting the ominous correlading sentence : "France will use her new rights wisely. Napoleon is not a man of many words. He thinks much but says little. We cannot doubt that he understands the situation as well as any of his numerous readers and critics, and that he has said and done what he deems best under the present circumstances. He is surrounded by many difficulties, which it must tax his energies to the ut most to keep from overwhelming him, and making havor of the fair fabric his skilful hands have constructed. We cannot agree with his Majesty in many of his views of public policy, but we cannot withhold our admiration for the wisdom and masterly ability with which he has steered . the ship of State through the many storms she has encountered since he has stood at the helm; and we fully sympathize with him in his final exclamation. where he says: "I trust in my people, my right and my conscience."

AN ORDINANCE TO ESTABLISH THE OFFICE OF CHIMNEY CONTRACTORS.

Be it ordained by the Mayor and Aldermen in City Council assembled, That from and after the passage of this Ordinance there shall be annually elected two Contractors for sweeping chimnoys; the first for all that part of the city, taking in Wards Nos. 1, 2, 3 and 4; and the second for all that part of the city, taking in Nos. 5 and 7, 6 and 8. Each of said contractors shall give bond to the City Council in the penal sum of two thousand dollars, with two good sureties, conditioned for the faithful performance of their duty.

Seo. 2. All and every person occupying a building with a chimney or chimneys thereto, in which a fire is usually made, shall allow and permit the said Contractor or Contractors to visit, inspect, and cause to be swept, the said chimney or chimneys once in every month, and he, she, or they pay for such sweeping, as herelinafter prescribed, the fees; and in case any person shall oppose or prevent the sweeping of any chimney as before directed, he, sho, or they, making such upposition, on conviction thereof before the Mayor, shall be fined in a sum not exceeding fifty dollars.

the Mayor, shall be fined in a sum not exceeding my dollars.

SEC. 3. If the Contractor for sweeping shall neglect this duty in not causing the said chimney to be swept perfectly neat and clean, or leaving any chimney which ought to be swept unswept for one month, so hereinbefore directed, said Contractor, on information before the Mayor of such neglect, shall, on conviction thereof, be fined a sum not exceeding fifty dollars, provided said fined a sum not exceeding fifty dollars, provided said Contractor was not opposed or prevented from sweeping said chimney; then the fine may be inflicted on the occupant or owner of the house.

Sec. 4: Said Contractor shall give notice in public print of the time and hour the chimney or chimneys is or are to be swept, which notice shall be given at least two days before, and such sweeping shall take place at a proper and convenient hour, and such Contractors shall keep each an office entitled a "Sweep Office," centrally located, where any person sending for a sweep shall be immediately accommodated with one, or as soon thereafter as possible.

SEC. 5. In all cases of neglect of the said Contractor SEC. 5. In all cases of neglect of the said Contractors not herein provided for, on conviction thereof before the Mayor, such Contractor shall be fined in any sum not exceeding fifty dollars; and that any sweep boy sweeping or offering to sweep chimneys in this city, unless licensed by the Contractor, shall be fined in a sum not exceeding five dollars, to be recovered in the Mayor's Court.

SEC. 6. The following fees shall be allowed for sweeping chimneys, viz.: ten cents for each story.

SEC. 7. Houses which have chimneys wherein anthractite coal is burnt exclusively, will not be required to be sweet only at the option of the owner or occupant.

For every truck drawn by two or more horses ormules, For every express wagon drawn by two or more horses or mules, \$60.
