SATURDAY MORNING, FEBRUARY 23, 1867. THE NEW RECONSTRUCTION BILL.

We lay before our readers this morning the Bill for the reconstruction of the Southern States, introduced by Senator Sherman, and amended by Messis. Wilson and Shellabarger. The Bill assed the Senate on Wednesday night, the 20th inst., by a vote of 35 yeas to 7 nays, Mr. Revendy Johnson voting yea. The following voted nay Messrs. Buckalew, Cowan, Davis, Hendricks NESMITH, PATTERSON and SAULSBURY. Absent and not voting : Messrs. ANTHONY, DIXON, DOCLITTLE GRIMES, GUTHRIE, HABRIS, McDOUGALL, NORTON

It will be seen that this Bill establishes militar rule in the Southern States, confers suffrage upo the negro, and disfranchises many of our citizens e., all those who are designated in the third see on of the Constitutional Amendment, Said third section reads as follows: "No perso

NYE, RIDDLE and SPRAGUE.

shall be a Senator or Representative in Congress or Elector of President and Vice-President, or hold any office, civil or military, under the United States, or under any State, who, having previously taken an oath as a member of Congress or as ar officer of the United States, or as a member of any State Legislature, or as an executive or judicial officer of any State, to support the Constitution of the United States, shall have engaged in insurrec tion or rebellion, or given aid and comfort to the enomies thereof. But Congress may, by a vote of wo-thirds of each House, remove such disability." This clause, it would seem, was drafted with

pecial reference to Article VI. of the Constitution of the United States, which reads as follows: "The Senators and Representatives before mentioned. and the members of the several State Legislatures. and all executive and judicial officers, both of the United States and the several :State:, shall be bound by oath or affirmation to support this Constitution." This provision has reference only to Governors, Judges, Chancellors, etc.; and to such only it would seem to us the above section of the Constitutional Amendment refers.

Of State officers, therefore, this would disfran hise members of the Legislature, the Governor. Lieutenant-Governor, the several Judges and Chancellors, but would not affect any one else. There are, however, various opinions as to

There is now naturally great speculation as to the probable course of the President. Upon a careful survey of events at Washington, and a consideration of the various conflicting statements that have emanated from that quarter within the past few weeks, we have come to the conclusion that Mr. Jourson will give his sanction to this Bill. It is understood that Messrs. Sewand, Stanton and McCullocs are in favor of it, as a basis of set tlement of the national difficulty. It is known that a number of Democrats voted for it; among them Senator REVERDY JOHNSON, who is believed to be entirely in the President's confidence. The President, it is said, will do this to secure the peace of the country, while he, at the same time. rids himself of the impeachment spectre, that has so long been harassing him. A few days will determine the question.

The following is the Bill :

Whereas, No legal State Governments or adequate protection for life or property now exist in the rebel States of Virginia, North Carolina, South Carolina, Georgia, Alabama, Mississippi, Louisiana, Florida, Texas and Arkensas; and whereas it is necessary that peace and good order should be an accessary that peace and good order should be applicated in said States until local, and Romblican. aforced in said States until loyal and Republican State Governments can be legally established;

Be it enacted, &c., That said rebel States shall be divided into military districts, and made sub-ject to the military authority of the United States, as hereinafter prescribed, and for that purpose Virginia shall constitute the first district; North Carolina and South Carolina the second district; Georgia, Alabama and Florida the third district; Mississippl and Arkansus the fourth district, and Louisiana and Texas the fifth district, and Exorton 2. That it shall be the duty of the Presi-dent to assign to the comment

dent to assign to the command of each of said districts an officer of the army not below the rank of Brigadier-General, and to detail a sufficient military force to enable such officer to perform his duties and enforce his authority within the dis-

duties and enforce his authority within the dis-trict to which he is assigned.

Szcrion 3. That it shall be the duty of each offi-cer assigned as aforesaid to protect all persons in their rights of person and property, to sup-press insurrection, disorder and violence, and to punish or cause to be punished all disturbers of the public passes and appropriate and violence. the public peace, and criminals; and to the end he may allow local civil tribunals to take jurisdiotion of and try offenders, or when in his judgment it may be necessary for the trial of offenders, he shall have power to organize military commissions or tribunals for that purpose, and all interference, under color of State authority, with the exercise of military authority under this Act, shall be null and void.

Section 4. That all persons put under military arrest by virtue of this Act shall be tried withou unnecessary delay, and no cruel or unusual punish-ment shall be inflicted, and no sentonce of any ment and be immered, and no sentence of any military commission or tribunal hereby author-ized, affecting the life or liberty of any person, ized; affecting the life or interty of any person, shall be executed until it is approved by the officer in command of the district; and the laws and regulations for the government of the army shall not be affected by this act, except in so far as they may

Secrios 5. That when the people of any of said government in conformity wiff, the Constitution
