In our Saturday's issue we published the full of the Military Reconstruction Bill, which sed the United States Senate on the evening of passed the United States Senate on the evening of the 20th. We now propose to examine into its pro-visions a little further. It opens with a preamble: "Whereas no legal State governments or adequate protection for life or property now exists in the Robel States of Virginia," etc.,—"and whereas it. is mosessary that peace and good order should be enforced in the said States until loyal and Republican State governments can be legally establish-ed." All mere assertion, without a word of well-sub-stantiated proof; yet deemed sufficient reason for a most unwarrantable interference with constitu ional liberty. But it is evident the main outline of this reconstruction policy had been pre-determined, and that the reasons for the same wer afterwards prefixed, to preserve a show of consis-

narchy; there is no law, and every one who see fit so to do, may commit any crime with impunity It is idle for us to contradict these assump ions. They are not facts, nor even based on fact This our readers know; and this also know the members of Congress who enacted the SHERMAN-WILSON-SHILLARAGEE Bill. The people of the North, many of them at least, doubtiess believe the assertion contined in the aforesaid preamble; Dut, as nothing that we can say will reach them, we forbear dwelling further on this part of the Bill. The South then is divided into five military districts, of which North and South Carolina shall titute the second; and the President assign listrict, lately known as the State of South Carolina nent, (in so far at least as the administra
