The following is the law restricting the appointing power of the President, as passed over the Ex-

SECTION I. That every person holding any civil office to which he has been appointed by and with the advice and consent of the Senate, and every person: who shall hereafter be appointed to any such office and shall become duly qualified to act therein, is and shall become duly qualified to act therein, is and shall be entitled to hold such office until a successor shall have been in like mancer appointed and duly qualified, except as hereinafter provided. Provided that the Secretaries of State, of the Treasury, of War, of the Navy, of the Interior, and the Postmaster-General and the Attorney-General, shall hold their offices respectively during the term of the President by whom they may have been appointed, and one month thereafter, subject to removal by and with the advice and consent of the Senate.
