A dispatch received by the Southern Relief Commission this afternoon, from Washington, states, on the authority of Gon. Howard, that although the proposed Congressional appropriation of \$1,000,000 for the relief of the suffering poor in the South will be passed, private contributions should not be curtailed.

Gen. Howard says that in addition to the one million of dollars from Congress, \$500,000 should be raised by the people.

Gov. Jonkins, of Georgia, telegraphs that the destitute in Georgia number sixty thousand whites and thirty thousand blacks, which is largely in excess of Grn. Howard's former estimate; and it is believed that the real destitution in South Carolina is even larger than in Georgia.

The Government has given the Relief Committee in this city the free use of the bark Purveyor, and she will be leaded this week with a full carge of corn. Her capacity is about twenty-five thousand bushels.

Every sailor's or immigrant's hotel or boarding, house keeper, and every agent, runner or employee of smo. hotel or boarding-house keeper, when boarding any vessel in the harbor of Charleston, or when inviting or soliciting the boarding or bodgene; when boarding any vessel in the harbor of or charleston, or when inviting or soliciting the boarding or bodgene; or of any humigrant, shall wear, comspicuously displayed, the shield or badge-referred to in the foregoing section.

XI. It shall not be lawful for any person, except those maxed in the preceding section.

XII. It shall not be lawful for any person, except those maxed in the preceding section to larve, wear, exhibit or display any such shield or badge to any of the crew employed on any vessel, or to any immigrant so arriving injudy of the crew employed or such immigrant er of any of the crew employed or such immigrant for four of the bearding or lodging of such immigrant or of any of the crew employed or such immigrant er of any of the crew employed or such immigrant er of any of the crew employed or such in the harbor of Charleston.
