SENATOR SHERMAN'S RESOLUTION.

We recognize in the resolution of Senator Suzi MAN relieving Governor Bnown, of Georgia, and Governor Parron, of Alabama, from the disabilities of the Reconstruction Act, the return of bet ter and kinder feelings, and an indication that the Government is willing to trust those who, however firm and active in the discharge of what they concoived to be their duty during the war, have ac-cepted the results of that war as final, and are willing to give their ability and influence to the completion of the only settlement which seems practicable. And whether we consider the devo-tion with which they did their duty to the Confederacy while it lasted, or the spirit in which they have declared their readiness to do their duty to the Union as it has been restored, no two public men are better entitled to this relief. But we can not help thinking that both in their own interes and in that of the country it is very questionable whether such an exceptional position is an advan tage, whether the object which the Government has at heart, and which men like these can se efficiently serve, will be furthered by separating them from the thousands in the South who acted with thom in the past, and who can act wisely and efficiently with them at present, and thus rendering them liable to the suspicion, if not to the charge, of being influenced in the advice they give, by the personal benefit which such advice may seem to

conquered people. The interest, the good sense the manly resolution to meet the conseq of a great failure, may control the Southern peo to accept it. And in time, when we become miliar with the new ideas and realize the broade system inaugurates, we will become reconciled to this now life. But it is idle and uscless to attemp to disguise the fact that we submit to nece and like wise men are endeavoring to make the best of a very disagreeable position. Our people need to be educated to their new duties to be taught how to use the conditions of this sudden and radical resolution in their thoughts, habite and interests. There is a large and most respecta-ble class of men who will be slow both to learn and to unlearn, and it is of great importance to our unfortunate section that this lesson should be learned quickly. The men who have hitherto enjoyed the public confidence can be of incalculable service in bringing about this resolute and intellidepends upon one condition—the people of the South, whom they advise and hope to influence, must feel sure of their perfect disinterestedness. Wo do not care how wise these men have become, how frankly they may recognize the mistakes which they have made, the people will neither listen to nor regard them if this obarge of opin-ion is to result in their personal advancement, and in their being made exceptions to the penalty which men as wise and good, as well entitled to the respect and confidence of the country, must pay for their participation in the past.

If the body of citizens disfranchised by the pro-visions of the Reconstruction Act, could and would

say to the people whose confidence they have shared, that they were honeatly of opinion that true wisdom and patriotism required a frank-ac-ceptance of the conditions of this Act. Mid the early re-organization of the State under its provi-sions, no more powerful agency for the settlement of this question could be found or would be needed. Their disfrarchisement would be the guarantee of the honesty of their conviction, and the unselfishexploded on Thursday, killing two men instantly.

It will be not only embarrassing but injurious to the best inherests of society to remove our present Judges, especially as nearly all the members of the Bar who could succeed them with propriety are in the same category. Now the relief of a few able politicians would not help us in this strait; to organize the State authorities efficiently would require a much larger list of exceptions. Nor can we see any immediate necessity for this measure. As soon as the officer appointed, takes command of his District, he will, it is to be presumed, order a registration. That registration will take time, then somes an election of delegates, then the meeting of the convention, they the adoption of the Constitution, then its ratification, then its reference to Congress and its final tion, then its reference to Congress and its final approval: In the meastime, the Provisional Govern-ment of the State is valid. We have now a Govment of the State is valid. We have now a Gov-ornor, Judges, a Legislature, who can go on quely in the discharge of their duties, until next fall at least. When the convention meets, when the State has given this proof of the good faith with which it has accepted the condition, then if the people feel that certain men are by their characters or abilities, necessary to the wise government of affairs, with what strength and confidence can that body ask of Congress their relief from dis-ability! ability!

We do not know how it is in other States, but
we think we speak the sense of this State when we think we speak the sense of this State when we say that we are sure there is no such difference between those who have incurred disfranchisement by their obedience to her command as would justify such an exception—that just as what they have done was from the conviction of a sacred duty, so what they will do will be to the best of their judgment for the honor, and interest of the State. The people of the State will listen to them more readily, they themselves will speak more freely and boldly, when no possibility of personal profit, no suspicion of selfish interest attaches to their words. We trust that the time is not far distant when they will all be made free to serve with renewed fidelity the State for which they have suffered, and when their wise and patrictic have suffered, and when their wise and patriotic conduct will have proved to the whole country that they are men to be trusted, but not men to be
