In the change demanded, the upland planters or farmers will find grape culture a substitute for their chief staple, which requires but trifling labor, and vastly more profitable. It shall not be lawful for any owner, agent, insider, or other person having charge of any vessel arilying or being in the port of Charleston, to permit or aminorize any saltors, hotel or boarding house keeper, not licensed as hereinafter provided, or any agent, runner or being house, to board, or attempt to board, any vessel arriving in, or lying, or ceing in the harbor or port of Charleston, before such vessel shall have been made fast to the whirf, or anchored, with intent to invite, sak or solidit the boarding of any of the crew employed on such vessel.

III. It shall not be lawful for any sailor's or immigrant's hotel or boarding house keeper, or the employee of any sailor's or in: ign ut's hotel or boarding house keeper, having boarded any vessel made fast to any wharf in the port of Charleston, to neglect or refuse to leave said vessel, after having been ordered so to do by the master or person having charge of such vessel.

IV. It shall not be lawful for any person to keep, conduct or carry on, either as owner, proprietor, agent or otherwise, any sailor's or immigrant's boarding house, or sailor's or immigrant's hotel, in the city of Charleston.

V. It shall not be lawful for any person, not having the license in this Act provided, or not being the regular agent, runner or employee of a person having such license, to invite, ask or solicit in the city of Charleston.
