New York, March 29th, 1867.-The grand masked and fancy dress annual ball of the Purim Association came off last night at the Academy of Music, as had been duly announced in the papers here, and MOULTRIE attended as per promise in his letter of the 22d to the NEWS. After a long discussion a substitute was adopted providing for an adjournment until July, and empowering the President of the Senate and Speaker of the House, if not otherwise ordered at the time, to declare an adjournment until December. A bill was passed ordering that the salaries of members of Congress shall be paid monthly. The bill providing for a survey for a canal around the falls of the Ohio River was taken up and passed. The bill fixing the time for the Bank apt act to go into effect was taken up. Pending its consideration the Senate went into executive session and at its close adjourned RESENTATIVES .- The Speaker laid before the House the resolu-tions adopted at the Radical Convention held in Baltimore on Wednesday last. Objection was made to their reception, but it was overruled by the Speaker, and Mr. Thomas, of Maryland, proceeded to address the House in favor of the immediate passage of the resolutions. Mr. Brooks, of New York, replied to Mr. Thomas. The resolu tions were finally referred to the Committee on the Judiciary. The question of adjournment was then called up and a resolution was passed to adjourn until Wednesday, June 5th, and if no quorum then appears, to ad-journ until September 3d, and if no quorum then appears, to adjourn until December. A resolution was adopted authorizing the Secretary of the Navy to allow the use of essels to send provisions to the ports of the South. A bill was passed making eight hours a legal day's work for all laborers and mechanics in Government workshops. The adjournment resolution as amended Senate was then taken up and the House refused to concur in the Senate amendments thereto and asked a committee of conference. The House concurred in the Senate smendments to the following bills: Bill for dredge boats at the mouth of the Mississippi; Senate amendments to the House bill relating to pay and mileage to members of Congress; Senate amendments to House bill in relation to imported wool, and Senate joint resolution authorizing the purhase of lands adjoining the Navy Yard as

Brooklyn. The House soon after adjourned.

FRIDAY'S PROCEEDINGS. Senate.—The petition of James L. Seward, member of Congress elect from Georgia and others, was presented and referred to the Committee on the Judiciary The petition asks that the disability to he under the provisions of the Constitutional Amendm ent be removed in their cases. Mr. Sherman, who presented the petition, stated that this could not be done until the Constitutional Amendment was adopted. The Committee on Indian Affairs was authorized to make a personal examination of the Indian territory during the recess of Congress. The bill fixing the time for the Bankrupt Act to go into effect was taken up, and after some discussion a vote was taken, and the bill was reject ed—yeas 14, nays 19. The Committee of Conference on the Senate Deficiency Ap-propriation Bill made a report, which was curred in. The committee of conference on the subject of adjournment report ed that they were unable to agree, and Mr Edmunds offered a resolution providing fo an adjournment at 12 M. to-day until the first Wednesday in July, and then, if a quorum of either House is not present, the act shall be communicated to the other, and both Houses shall adjourn sine die.
