

II. It shall not be lawful for any owner, agent, master, or other person having charge of any vessel arriving or being in the port of Charleston, to permit or authorize any saliors, hotel or boarding house keeper, not licensed as hereinafter provided, or any agent, runner or employee of any sallor's or immigrant's hotel or boarding house, to board, or attempt to board, any vessel arriving in, or lying, or ceing in the harbor or port of Charleston, before such vessel shall have becamede fast to the wharf, or anchored, with intent to invite, salt or solicit the boarding of any of the crew employed on such vessel.

III. It shall not be lawful for any sallor's or immigrant's hotel or boarding house keeper, or the employee of any sallor's or im ligrant's hotel or sowning house keeper, having boarded any vessel made fast to any wharf in the port of Charleston, to neglect or remake to leave said vessel, after having charge of such vessel.

IV. It shall not be lawful for any person to keep, conduct or carry on, either as owner, proprietor, agent or otherwise any sallor's got uning any bearing house. HAVING ON HAND A LARGE SUPPLY OF READYMADE CLOTHING, suitable for Gentlemen, Ladies and Children, and being desirous of diminishing our

IV. It shall not be lawful for any person to keep, conduct or carry on, either as owner, proprietor, agent or otherwise, any sailor's or immigrant's boarding house, or sailor's or immigrant's boarding house, or sailor's or immigrant's boarding house, without having a license from the City Council thereof.

V. It shall not be lawful for any person, not having the license in this Act provided, or not being the regular agent, runner or employee of a person, having such license, to invite, sak or solicit in the city or harbou of Charleston, the boarding or lodging of, any of the orew employed on any vessel, or of any immigrant arriving in the said city of Charleston.

VI. The City Council shall take the application of any person applying for a license to keep a sailors' or immigrant's hotel, in the city of Charleston, and upon estistictory evidence to them of the respectability and competency of such applicant, and of the suitableness of his accommodations, shall issue to him a license, which shall be good for one year, unless sooner revoked by said City Council, to keep a sailor so rimmigrant's boarding house in the city of Charleston, and to invite and solicit boarders for the same.

VII. The City Council may, upon satisfactory evidence SEC. 3, The following shall neventer be the rates for licenses for public and private carts, drays, wagons, &c., including the horses or mules used thereof, which shall be free from other taxation:
PUBLIC CARTS, DRAYS, ETC., OR THOSE EMPLOYED IN ANY BUSINESS WHATEVER, FOR HIRE DIRECT OR INDIRECT.

For every cart, dray or wagon, drawn by one horse or mule and

It shall not be lawful for any person, except those named in the preceding section, to _ave, wear, exhibit or display any such shield or badge to any of the crew employed on any vessel, or to any immigrant so arriving in the city of Charleston, with the intent to invite, ask or solicit the boarding or lodging of such immigrant or of any of the crew employed on any vessel being in the harbor of Charleston.

XII. Whoever shall offend against any or either of the provisions contained in section 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 10 and 11, in this Act, shall be ceemed guilty of a mindemeanor, and shall, upon conviction thereof, be punished by imprisonment for a term not exceeding one year, and not less than thirty days, or by a fine not exceeding two hundred and fifty dollars, and not less than one hundred dollars, or by both such fine and imprisonment.


XIII. The word "vessel," as used in this Act, shall include vessels propelled by steam.
