The prosecutor not only charged the prisoner with different thefts, but boldly testified that he himself had knicked him down with his stick when he threatened him, which piece of evidence was most fully sustained by Prince having a hole in his head, and a countenance like "blood-boiled Banquet." The Mayor sentenced him to one week's imprisonment.
