THE PROFITS OF AGRICULTURE IN VIRGINIA. We publish the following from the Richmond Whig, as a matter of interest to our planters, and should be pleased if any of them would give us a simple estimate of what can be done in South Carolina.

HALIFAX COUNTY, VA., April 15, 1867. To the Editor of the Whig: I was frequently questioned as to the probable profits of agriculture in Virginia. In order to answer intelligently I have made a rough estimate of the profits of agriculture in this State, and I have the honor to send you the result.

ESTIMATE OF PROFITS OF ONE HAND. One hand will cultivate 10,000 plants (24 acres) of cotton and yield 100 bales. The cost of seed, fertilizer, and other expenses is \$100. The net profit is \$200.
