And this brings us to the second assumption in the Governor's argument, and that is, that if we vote "no convention" by a majority, then the present Military Government, will continue until some indefinite good time which is coming. To this we would say:

The colred vote of the State will be an unit for the Convention and the white vote will be divided, the only practical result being that as the freedmen believe that the call of the Conrention is necessary to the establishment by State legislation of their newly acquired rights, they will regard this effort to avoid a Conven tion as a symptom of bad faith on our part and tice, and we will lose the opportunity to secure that harmony of political action between the the well being of both.

2. In the next place suppose such a vote prevail what guarantee have we that the Military Government, as it exists now, would be continued? If it is so agreeable to us at present that we will defy the reconstruction act to preserve it, cannot the same Congress which made compel us to call a Convention to get rid of it And does Governor PERRY suppose for an instant, that the power which has kept us out as whenever it sees fit?

3. And even if this Military Government is allowed to continue, how does that save us from universal suffrage? Sec. 6 of the Military Bill provides "That

Indeed is not universal suffrage insagurated by the very vote Convention or no Convention, and how will "no Convention" benefit us, unless the Governor considers that it will be a benefit to have all the Legis lative rower of the State vested in the Milita ry Commander, and all the administration officer selected by universal suffrage?

The third assumption of Governor Penny is that the reconstruction act is a violation of the constitutional rights of the State, and ought, therefore, to be rejected. We cannot discuss the principle here involved at present, but we ask the Governor if it is correct, how can we with any more consistency accept the President's policy of reconstruction? Is the appointment of Gen. Sickles as Military Commande any clearer violation of the constitutional violity of South Carolina, than his own appointment as Provisional Governor? And is the imposition of universal suffrage any more direct interfer ence with the rights of the State, than Gover-nor Pruca's Troclamation, calling, inder the President's direction, a Convention of the State, upon a basis of representation in express direct violation of the provisions, of the State Constidid by his mere will and pleasure, "abolish the odious Parish representation," and change the

onstitutional character of the State? We have had occasion, and we hope have still further occasion, to express sincere-ly and fully our admiration of the good sense nd good temper of the military commander of this District, but we certainly have not reached, and are very sure that he himself could never wish us to reach, that point where we should regard Gen. SIGHLES as a despot by divine right.
