We are sending out at present, a great num ber of bills for subscription and advertising, and most earnestly request that all those who may recoive them, will have the kindness to make prompt remittances. A great many of these accounts have been standing for a year and more, and it is absolutely necessary now that they should be paid.

We have received in advance a copy of the annual report of the President of this Road, which we hope in a day or two to lay before our readers, we are to be religious salelie. There is no Road in this State of more im

portance to our people, for it is in fact the only means of communication between Columbia and the upper districts, and is one of the large feeders of the trade of this city, by bringing to it the crops of those sections of the State, which yould be forced without its means of transport o seek other markets. And it has been of late especially serviceable in enabling the supplies of corn and other food to be carried into those portions of the State which were suffering from absolute want. But it must play a still more important part in future and become the chief link by which we will make that western connection, which, it seems to us, is the only reliance which Charleston has for increasing trade

and prosperity. The financial condition of the road is unforunately embarrassed. Heavy losses in Confederate securities, destruction of its line and some of the largest and most expensive of its bridges by the war and freshet, and the reduced freight and travel consequent upon the poverty of the country, have all combined to educe its income to the minimum point. Aso the means by which its finances are to be estored we will not undertake to speak, for we are scarcely competent judges, but we do not think too much praise can be awarded Mr. HAMETT, the president, of the road, for the energy which he has shown in overcoming the difficulties by which he was surrounded, and enabling the road to do the work which even now it has to accomplish. The following exract from the report will exhibit the difficul-

ies to be overcome. "The year has been one of great difficulty and labor. At the beginning of the year the work was in progress to close the gap from Columbia to Alston, caused by the war and freshet, and in repairing and gtting up the rolling stock left, to do the business of the road. The trains were then only running from Alston to the upper end of the line. On the 1st of March the company commenced receiving freights in Columbia to be sent through; but to do this, they could only be carried on the road to Freshleys; there to be unloaded, hauled to the river in wagons, and carried by boats to Alston, and there reloaded on the cars to be sent to the various points of destination. As the work progressed, the distance run by boats was diminished, until on the 21st of May the rack reached the river at Alston, and the boating ceased; but still the freights, both up and down, had to be unloaded, hauled in wagons to and from the banks of the river, and both freight and passengers carried across in boats, until the 1st of September, when the bridge was completed, and the entire line reopened. The difficulty and expense consequent upon this state of things, when constant changes of places of shipment were necessarily made, and the confusion which resulted from an irregular way of working the road, may well be imagined. From the 1st of June until the completion of the bridge many of those employed upon the work were sick, as well as the agents, clarks and laborers at the depots on each side of the river at Alston,

which greatly delayed the completion of the And when we consider that by the last accounts the road had so far accomplished its work that all freight which had been received at its depots, with the exception of the last three or four days, had been forwarded, the energy of the President and employees of the road will

be fully appreciated. The gross income of the road from all sources has been \$251,931.19. Its current expenses \$144,730.37. Making a net income of \$107,200.82.

The probabilities are that the business of the road will be very largely increased in the coming year; for very large quantities of guano have been transported on the line, and the prospect is fair for a very great increase of freight on the coming crop.

We shall probably return to this subject when we publish the report; and in the mean time will express the hope that means will be found to put its finances in easy condition, and thus secure to the State the full benefit of one of which may be put down at \$250,000. Be it Ordained, That from and after the first day of January next, every person keeping a shop or store, or engaged in mercantile business in the City of Charleston, shall post up, and keep posted up, in some conspicuous place, at his or her pusiness stand or stands, a conspicuous Sign Board or Plate, containing his or her given name and surname of each member of the firm; and every person so offending, or making default herein, shall forfeit and pay to the City a penalty of fifty dellars for each and every offence or default, and in addition thereto a further sum of fifty dellars for each and every month during which the provisions of this Ordinance month during which the provisions of this Ordinance shall remain not complied with: Provised, however That nothing herein contained shall apply to the special partners of a limited partnership.

table, bench, stall-board, box, or other appendage, in any street, lane, alley, or public thoroughfare, or any foot-pavement within the City, under a penalty of Twenty Dollars for each and every such offence, and for each and every night or day, as the case may be, on which any such offence is committed: Provided, however, That Vendue Masters shall be permitted to expose before their stores such goods and commodities as they sell at public auction, but not to take up more room than the front of their respective vendue stores, and to the distance of six feet beyond the same.

SEC. 6. No person or persons whoseever, shall suffer any site wood, coals, goods, wares, merchandise, carriages of any description, or any other matter or thing, to him, her, or them belonging or consigned, to lay or stand for a longer space than four hours, in any street, lane, alley, or public thoroughfare within the City, under a penalty of Two Dollors, with costs, for every hour that any such article or thing shall so lay or stand beyond the above mentioned time: excepting materials for that any such article or thing shall so lay or stand beyond the above mentioned time: excepting materials for building, in regard to which the fo.lowing regulations shall be observed, namely: When any person or persons shall erect or repair any house or other building, upon any street, lane, alley, or open court, within the city, he, she, or they shall make application for the use of so much of the street or public way as shall not exceed the front of the lot on which such building is to be erected, nor extend more than six feet into the street; which space such person or persons shall forthwith enclose with a sufficient fence, at least six feet high, in order to deposit within the same the requisite materials for building and remairing:


