NEW YORK, APRIL 28.—The telegrams received from Washington to-day, forecasting the decision of the Supreme Court upon the constitutionality of the reconstruction act, have taken every one by surprise, notwithstanding the circumstance that every fair-thinking man, be he politician or not, is well aware of the fact that such a decision would be a very just and lawful one. Serious apprehensions have been excited in regard to the consequences that might ensue from a conflict in which two great departments of the government will be arrayed against the third, for it is believed that Congress will carry on and will resist to such measures as will virtually invalidate the action of the Supreme Court. Although there is no question as to the fact that it would be lawful for the Supreme Court to grant the injunction prayed for, yet it is very doubtful whether the interests of the South would be best subserved thereby or not, and some of the best friends to the South have been fearful as to the result. They argue that if a law be passed authorizing the opening of a stable door and the liberation of a number of undisciplined steeds, it were an easy matter to open the door and excite the law; but when the feet and half grown colts are at large in the open fields, it may be easy to get the law on their backs, and they will carry their law by carrying the steeds in; and the more so when those who were directed the doors had been thrown open stand at the entrance, with long poles in their hands, to drive away the colts as they happen to be coming toward them. The allusion is obvious, and needs no explanation.
