[GENERAL DADESS NO. 1.]

I. IN COMPLIANCE WITH GENERAL ORDERS 10, Headquarters of the Army, March 11th, 1867, the dersigned hereby assumes command of the Second tary District constituted by the Act of Congress, P. No. 68, 2d March, 1867, entitled "An Act for the violetic government of the rebel States."

II. In the execution of the duty of the Comm. Jing General to maintain the security of the inhabitant in their persons and property, to suppress insurrection, distorder and violence, and to punish or cause to be punished and disturbers of the public peace and criminals, the local civil tribunals will be permitted to take jurisdiction of and try offenders, excepting only such cases as may by the order of the Commanding General be referred to a Commission or other military tribunal for trial.

III. The civil government now cristing in North Carolina and South Carolina is provisional only, and in all respects subject to the paramount authority of the United States, at any time to aboliah, modify, control or supercode the same. Local laws and municipal regulations not inconsistent with the Constitution and laws of the United States, et any time to aboliah, modify, control or supercode the commanding General, are hereby declared to be in force; and, in conformity therewith, civil officers are hereby authorized to continue the varcies of their proper functions, and will be respective and obeyed by the inhabitants.

IV. Whenever any Civil Officer, Magistrate or Court neglects or refuses to perform an official ast property.

IV. Whenever any Civil Officer, Magistrate or Court neglects or refuses to perform an official act properly required of such irribunal or officer, whereby due and rightful accurity to person or property shall be denied, the case will be reported by the Post Commander to these Headquarters.

V. Post Commanders will cause to be arrested persons with the commission of crimes and offences. IV. Whenever any Civil Officer, Magistrate or Cou

V. Post Commanders will cause to be arrested persons charged with the commission of ortimes and offences when the civil authorities fail to arrest and bring such when the civil authorities fail to arrest and bring such offenders to trial, and will hold the accused in custody for trial by Military Commission, Provost Court or other tribuist organized pursuant to orders from those Head, quarters. Arrest by military authority will be reported promptly. The charges preferred will be accompanied by the evidence on which they are founded. VI. The Commanding General, desiring to preserve tranquitity and order by means and agencies most congeniate to the people, solicits the scalous and cordial cooperation of civil officers in the discharge of their duties, and the aid of all good citizens in presenting conduct tending to disturb the peace; and to the end that occasion may soldern artse for the exercise of military authority in matters of ordinary civil administration, the commanding General respectfully and carnessly commends to the people and authorities of North and South Carolina unreserved obedience to the authority move established, and ine diligent, considerate and impartial execution of the laws onacted for their government.

VII. All orders herefore published to the Department of the Bouth are bereby continued in force.
