We are indebted to Messra. Zoobaun, Young & Co., in King street, for a handsome copy of a new translation of Scinician's complete works. While we are not emulous of the .ame as a critic of the we are not entitions of the same as a critic of the country editor who gravely reviewed Sitatspains; and patronizingly "allowed" there was a great deal of hard good series in those plays and poems, we nevertheless think that a brief reference to this, the most widely read and best beloved German poet, may not be out of place; the more so, as he is still but very imperfectly known to English and American readers. In 1833, when the centennial anniversary of the birthely of Schiller was celebrated among Germans all over the world, great interest was over-where manifested in all that related to the poot, his life, and though his westing. lated to the poet, his life and times, his writings, the estimate they are held in by his countrynen, and the great influence they have exercised in German thought and life during the present contury. But nearly eight years have transpired since, and affairs material and more pressing have again obliterated that spasmodic interest, and it may not be amiss, therefore, to refresh the memory, as the opportunity is afforded to us by the appearance of this translation.

JOHN CHRISTOPH FRIEDRICH SCHILLER WAS D in Marbach in Wurtemburg, November 11, 1759. His early years we're full of trouble. The Grand Duke was anxious to educate him a soldier, while his father had destined him for the church, to which indeed at that time his own inclinations also directed him. The struggle ended at last—after countless sufferings and sorrows to the young poet, which it is needless here to enter upon in detail, by his adopting netthing profession, but following his own bent—wooing the nuses. Poetry had over been his leading passion. He drank early and deep at the fountain where HOMER and VIRGIL ed divinest strains. KLOPSTOCK and GOETH were his later masters. He had found his voca-tion, and throw himself into it with all the ardor and enthusiasm of his fiery nature. The drama was specially attractive to him, and he was still but a mere youth when he astounded the world with his "Robbers." This remarkable play was begun in his niueteenth year. Carlyle says of it: "It is the production of a strong, untutered spirit, consumed by an activity for which there is no outlet, indiguant at the barriers which restrains it, and grappling darkly with the phantoms to which its own energy, thus painfully impris-oned, gives being. A rude simplicity, combined with a gloomy and overpowering force, are its chief characteristics. They remind us of the de-fective cultivation. fective cultivation, as well as of the fervid and

highest feelings of its author."

"The Robbers proved immensely popular, but the doctrine inculcated proved unpalatable to the Grand Duke, and young SCHILLES had to flee the country to save himself from a prison. his fame is indissolubly connected. His career however was a short one, for in 1805, May 8, the fell destroyer claimed his brilliant prize, and the young life, so full of hope, so fair with promise, was cut off, ere it had passed its noon.

CARLYLE, at once the most competent and ap-

preclative of his English critics, thus sums up SCHILLER'S character: "He had a mind of the highest order; grand by nature, and cultivated by the assiduous study of a life-time. It is not the predominating force of any one faculty that impresses us in SCHILLER, but the general force of all. Every page of his writings bears the stamp of interna vigor, new truths, new aspects of known truth, bold thought, happy imagery, lefty emotion. His ency was rather to adore the grand and the lofty, than to despise the little and the mean. Perhaps, his greatest faculty was a half-poetical, alf-philosophical imagination, a faculty tecuning with magnificence and brilliancy; now adorning, or aiding to creet, a stately pyramid of scientific or-stong to creet, a stately pyramic of scientime speculations; now brooding over the abysess of thought and feeling, till thoughts and feelings, else unutterable, were embedied in expressive forms, and palaces and landscapes, glowing in othereal beauty, rose like exhalations from the bosom of the deep."

mentioning his so-called minor pieces, many of which are even better known, and more popular than any or all of his dramas. These have been often translated, but by none better than by Bur-wen, whose version is retained in the eclectic translation of the poet, now pefore us. "The Robbers" are translated by Henny G. Bonn, Esq., who also furnished the Fiesco and Love and Intrigue. All very good. Don Cartos is translated by R. D. Boylan, Eq., and his version eminonity successful. "The Camp of Wallenstein" is by James Guungmill; the "Piccolomini" and the "Death of Wallenstein," by Mr. Colember. This version is so well known, that it is needless to say anything of it. It is rarely the good fortune of a poet to find so genuine a poet willing to do the laborious yet humble work of translation.

bost extant translation of each separate produc-tion of Schiller, and those of our readers who have heard their Gorman friends speak with rapture of Schillen, and have regretted that the pleasure of reading him is denied them, can now gratify so laudable a curiosity and make them-selves acquainted with the thoughts of the immortal bard, even though they cannot read his original German words.
