On the 10th February, 1852, the Committee made their report, and as it is based almost outrely upon legal considerations, I have no doubt it was made upon conforence with me, and under my advice. I enclose a copy of this report.

The report states that the taxes paid on dividends, during the four years last past, amounted to a very large with of money. That in a few cases they had been paid under what was called a protest. That no protest had been made to the City Council, nor had there been any correion of legal process, and that there was much variance in the torms of the protests. The report concludes with recommending that the prayer of the petitioners be not granted, and that the parties be left to their legal remedies, should they see fit to pursue them. The report was adopted by Council, and there has been no other action of Council thereon, except the reference to me upon Mr. Burckmeyer's recent petition.

It is my opinion, however, that if a tax be paid by one under a distinct protect, on the ground of illogality, while the question is being judicially leasted by others, it may be recovered back; if the tax be declared illegal. A demand like this is barred in four years if there be no suit, and no proof of promise or acknowledgment. The most favorable view of the protestants is that the statute began to run from the time that the tax is declared illegal. Perhaps the more correct local view is that it began to run from the time of payment. It does not appear that Mr. Burckmoyer commonced suit before April, 1866. The taxes were paid in 1848, 1849, 1850 and 1851, and the tax was declared illegal in 1852. When, therefore, this matter came before me again, after this long lipse of time, in the abape of a writ, I felt it my duty to plead the statute of limitations on behalf of Council. It is my duty to advise them, and in case of suit, to take in their behalf all legal defences. If they think proper to vaive them, or any of them, under particular circumstances, they may so direct.

I have no doubt Mr. Burckmoyer did apply to the Mayer and hold conversations with him, but I do not find that there was any writ sued dut prior to 1866, nor any application to Council since their report in 1832/nor any promise of acknowledgment of the claim on their back. In other words, I do not see anything to take the case out of the distate, if it he insisted on.
