THE FOLLOWING ORDINANCE IS PUBLISHED for the information of all persons concerned: AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND AN ORDINANCE TO RAISE SUPPLIES FOR THE YEAR 1867, AND FOR OTHER PURPOSES.

I. Be it ordained by the Mayor and Aldermen in City Council assembled, That all taxes payable under the Ordinance to raise supplies for the year 1867, and for other purposes, be paid on or before the 29th day of June next: and that persons who shall make default of payment of their taxes on that day, shall pay, in addition to the amount of their taxes, one and a half per cent. per month until the 31st day of July, when, it not paid, an amount of two perl cent. per month upon the amount of taxes shall be paid; and after the 21st day of August three per cent. per month on the amount of taxes due shall be paid until payment of the whole amount is made. If. That all persons who neglect or fail to pay their monthly taxes on or before the fifteenth day of each month, shall respectively pay on the amounts thereof, two per cent per month from such fifteenth day, until payment is made. payment is made.
