L. Be it enucted, by the Senate and House of Representatives, now met and sixting in General Assembly, and oy the authority of the same. That it shall not be lawful for any person, ex-ept a pilot or public officer, to board or uttempt to board a vessel arriving in the port or narbor of Charleston, before such vessel shall have been made fast to the whart, without first obtaining leave from the master or person having charge of such vessel, or from her owner or agents. wher or agents. II. It shall not be lawful for any owner, agent, mast

owner or agents.

XIII. The word "vessel," as used in this Act, shall include vesses propelled by steam.

For the due protection of the said contractor or contractors, it is further ordained, That every owner, lessee, occupant and tenant of any premises fronting in any street, lane, alley, or open court, shall on every day (Sundaye excepted) have the dirt, filth, garbage, or other offal, placed in front of his or her lot, in a barrel, box or heap, and in readmess for the contractor, by the hour of seven o'clock, A. M., from the first day of May to the first day of November in every year; and by the hour of nine o'clock, A. M., from the first day of November to the first day of May following. And any person offending herein, or placing any dirt, filth, garbage, or other offal, in any street, lane, or alley, or open court, after the hours above named, shall be subject to a fine not less than two nor more than fire dollars, for each and every offence, to be imposed by the Mayor.
