AN ECONOMICAL ICE HOUSE.—During the present intense heat it is extremely difficult to preserve ice from melting, and it becomes necessary to invest largely in order to secure the correct tomperature. A contrivance has been recently invented that will not only effect a great saving of ice, but is so simple as to be in the reach of all. It consists of a stone jar placed upon and surrounded with a bed of rosin, the whole contrivance being enclosed in a box. It is easily made, the bed being first in a box. It is easily made, the bed being first made of rosin in the box, the jar placed upon it, and then melted rosin poured into the box, thus filling up completely all of the interstires. 
