A CHANGE OF BASE .- The Daily Press, of Augusta, comes to us the same in size and appearance, but under a new name. It has been born agtin and is now known as the National Republican, edited by D. G. Corring, and published by the Georgia Printing Company, of which the former proprietor and publisher is the chief agent. In the notice of the change the editor says:

the notice of the change the editor says: The name of the paper is a sufficient indication of its principles, as those principles are understood here-to wit, that to desire and advocate a return to the Union by the only means by which such a return can be effected, is to be Republican. Sub-ordinating all minor matters, I shall devote its columns to the great object now most prominently in view-the restoration of the Southern States to their full participation in the Government of the Union, and the perpetuation of that Union when restored. restored.

IMPORTANT TO RAILEOAD MEN .-- We copy from the Savannah Republican an account of an invention that is destined to revolutionize the manage-

ment of railroads; and as it is a matter of great importance, we give the piece in full ; "One of the most valuable inventions pertaining to railroads that has ever been made has recently

been perfected by Mr. J. P. WHITE, a Savannah anic. The invention, for which he has secured a patent, was conceived and perfected by him while guarding a railroad during the war. The main feature of the switch is that the engineer has in his own hands the machinery by which he can switch the train from the main to the outside track while the train is in motion. It is adjusted by levers attached to the locomotive in front of the forward wheels, and so arranged as to be casily managed while the cars are in full motion. These levers coming in contact with others attached to the switch itself, produces the desired change immediately. Care, however, must be taken that the lever opposite the desired course is used. As soon as the switch is moved from one side to the other it locks by means of levers, and remains so vntil another

change is effected. "From the above it will be seen that great time and expense is saved, as the switches can be managed by the engineer, thus abolishing switch tenders. This invention is also a sure preventive of cars running off the track, and there can be no danger of loss of life by the neglect or carelessness of switch tenders. For railroads it is really invaluable, and we cordially recommend it to our railroad friends."

MAYOR'S COURT .- Saturday proved to be a dull day in legal matters, and little business was transacted by any of the Courts. The Mayor's Court was apparently deserted, and the few cases on the docket only occupied a short time.

AN ORDINANCE TO REGULATE THE STORAGE OF PETROLEUM, ITS PRO-DUCT, AND OTHER INFLAMMABLE OILS. SEC. 1. Be it ordained by the Mayor and Aldermen, in City Council assembled, That from and after the 15th day of June next, it shall not be lawful to keep Petroleum. Kerosene, Rock Oil, Benzine, Benzole, or any other in flammable oil or oils on storage or for sale in any cellar, store or building south of Line street, in a larger quan-tity than fifty gallons on any one lot or premises, and any such quantity so kept or stored shall be contained in vessels of tin or other metal.
