New Cure for Yellow Fever.

Considerable attention is paid by the press of the West Indies to a cure recently adopted by a physician in Jamaica, Dr. Alex. Fiddes, F. R. C. B. E. It has run the rounds of the Spanieh, English, Fronch and Danish Journals, and everywhere meets with the highest oncomiums. Several of the Governments interested in the West Indies have set apart hospital buildings for the special treatment of yellow fever under Dr. Fiddes process. As that dread disease is making considerable ravarees in the Fouthern part of the United States, we give the following account of the treatment:

Calomel, quinine and all other medicines are set aside, as being not only useleas, but positively intuines; the only medicine recommended in a full dess of caster oil at the beginning of the disease. The rome y of Dr. Fiddes then consists in the internal administration of sulphurous acid, combined with the external application of iced sheets around the body when the skin is not and dry, or with an occasional vapor bath when the skin is dry without being very hot. The sulphurous acid is not given in its pure form, but combined with an alkaline base, such as the bi-sulphurod with an alkaline base, such as the bi-sulphurod with an alkaline base, such as the bi-sulphure of soda, the sulphito of magnesia or potash, or of ammonia, of which the former preparation is probably the best, being tasteless and not likely to offend the stomach. The dose is twenty grains every two or three hours in a glass of water.

The use of sulphurous acid and the application of the wet sheets or vapor bath are indicated as much by the dictates of theory as ay the lessons of experience. The first is a preventive against the fermentation of the blood; the two latter are potent agencies for withdrawing poisonous mater from the body without weakening the vital powers.

Bive Professor Poli, of Milan, instituted his observate series of experiments to test the efficacy of sulphurous acid in arresting fermontation in the blood of animals, and since Dr. De Ricci, in Dublin, and Professor Burgraeve, of Ghent, repeated the same, the therapeutical power of this medicine has been well known to the medical profession. But Dr. Fiddes is entitled to the credit of having introduced it as a remedy for yellow faver and several other diseases of the zymotic family. There seems to be no doubt of the efficacy of this new treatment, and Dr. Fiddes will have the oracle to thaving, in a great measure, relieved the West Indies of the dread which Europeans have in settling in them, bendes preventing much suffering and untimely death; and it is but natural to hope he will reap some substantial benefit from a discovery which he has so generously made public through the West India press.

GOLD MINES IN THE TRIBUTAINES OF THE SOUTH-WEST.—The Salt Lake Vedette of the Slet of July has the following about the gold mines recently discovered on the headwaiers of the Sweetwater, in Utah:

"'According to the statements of all those with whom we have talked, the existence of numerous gold bearing quartz-ledges on the north side of the Sweetwater is a demonstrated fact. The discovery claims of Lowis Robinson, Terry and that company, are exceedingly rich, so far as developed. With ordinary hand mortara, selected rock was being pounded out at a yield of from \$25 to \$40 a day to the mortar, and even as high as \$100. The existence of placer diggings has not been discovered to any great extent, some two or three gulches only. Little prospecting for placers had been done. In coming out from the mines some parties crossed through the country where the Bandys rise, which had all the appearance of a wash country, and looked as though it would bear prospecting. Not having their mining implements alray, and the danger impending from an Indian attack, prevented the parties from prospecting that locality. It is said that across the ridge in the Wind River country, that surface indications are good. But we regret to be compelled to state that all those who ventured over there did not come back alive. We have tried to find out the names of the three men who crossed the ridge, and who are said to be missing yet, but have not succeeded. Lawrence and Tony Scholl were killed by the Indians about noon of the 22d, and Orrin Tavlor was killed the same day.
