#### WHY DODGE THE 188PE

In 1860, the States of the North and those of the South were widely separated on the point of the right of secession. The South naintained, that the States composing the Unon under the rights reserved by the Constitution, could dissolve the compact at any time hat they might desire so to do, while the North on the other hand insisted that the com pact was perpetual. A difference so radical as this could be decided by no civil court, and noth parties appealed to the only tribunal which can decide the quarrols of bodies of me sufficiently large to constitute nations, the tri bunal of arms. That tribunal decided against the South, and the issue of the war is a decla ration that the Union of the States is perms ent and that no State or number of States can dissolve that Union.

It is true that BENJAMIN WADE WAS DO ery anxious for the war, but would have preferred to have let the Southern States make the experiment of a government of their own though to-day he chooses to forget this and declares, what he knows to be false, that but for the aid and comfort afforded the Southern leaders by the democracy of the North, there would have been no war." And he continues, "I charge upon this great organized party the responsibility of 300,000 of the flower of our youth lying in their graves.

It is true that WENDELL PHILLIPS openly adocated the right of secession until 1862, though he to-day pretends to desire a continu ance of the Union, and cants eloquently abou the soldiers of the nation. It is true that Mr. CHASE said that the Union was not worth fight ing for, though he to-day occupies the seat of Chief Justice of the United States. It is true that Honace Grenzey said in the Tribune in 1860, "any attempt to compel the Souther States to remain by force would be contrary to the principles enunciated in the immortal declaration of independence, -contrary to the fundamental ideas on which human liberty is based;" though he to-day is blatant about the sin of rebels and the horrible crimes that we committed in endeavoring to dissolve the Union. It is true that these opinions of Radical lead ers encouraged the South. It is also true that these men are to-day the leaders of the Radi car party, but it the people of the North had listened to the teachings the South would have been permitted to depart in peace. The people of the North in 1861, did not how ever heed the Radical leaders of to-day They had faith in the Union, they esteemed i o be of value, and standing on what they be lieved to be a correst interpretation of the Constitution, Democrat and Republican, side by side, determined to crush out what they like considered a political heresy, and to support by arms the permanency of this gov ernment. Mr. Lincoln and Congress both declared this on more than one occasion. Having been ended in favor of the Northern idea, it follows as a thing of course, that no State ever was out of the Union, even for a single instant. If no State ever was out of the Union, then every State on the restoration of peace is entitled to all safeguards and guarantees of the Constitution. Admit that the war was a just war on the part of the North, and this is the necessary conclusion. If each State is entitled to the protecion of the Constitution, then it is true that if any one State is deprived of that protection the Constitution is disregarded. If it is disregarded to-day for one State or set of States, it will be disregarded to-morrow for other States wherever the opinions of their people are not

n harmony with the views of the majority. The course of the Radical party has been to obtain and propagate its power by deceiving the masses at the North, by subverting the Constitution, and saixing and taking from the States their rights under that compact. Their aims are revolutionary.
