THE AUTUMNAL EQUINOX,-About the 21st of September, the ecliptic, or great circle which the sun appears to describe in the heavens in the course of the year, crosses the torrestrial equator. The point of intersection is called the equinoctial point, or the equinox, because at that period, from its position in relation to the sun, the earth, as it revolves on its axis, has exactly one-half of its surface illumined by the sun's raw, while the surface illumined by the sun's rays, while the other half remains in darkness, producing the phenomenon of equal day and night all over the world. These periods are termed, from the seasons in which they occur, the autumnal and vernal equinox. At this time the sun rises about six o'clock in the morning and sets nearly the sam time in the evening. In the autumnal equinox the sun is passing from north to south, and conse-quently from this period the days in the Northern Hemisphere gradually shorten until the 21st of December, the winter solstice is reached, from which season they gradually lengthen to the spring or vernal equinox, on the 21st of March, when day and night are again equal.
