

Meanwhile the burden of national indebtedness has increased, heavier taxes have been imposed, and now, that thousands of men are discharged from military employment, the principal cities are filled with idlers-some of whom, no doubt, are filled with intera-some of whom, no doubt, are "fit for treason, stratagem and spoils." The whole situation, as we understand it, is well explained in a single sentence from a London paper, which says : "It is to this overcrowding that the distress of nearly all the Italian centres of population is owing, and that while the fruits of the earth are rolling in the field for lack of husbandmen, swarms of equalid paupors and sturdy beggar aro infesting the town streets with cries for 'bread





Terms were offered which we could not accopt without forfeiting our own self-respect. They were rejected as all honest men knew that they would be, and Reconstruction acts, bayonets and "manhood suffrage' were substituted in the place of the Constituwere substitution in the place of the Constitu-tional Amendment. At this point, they were met by the statement, what is justice to the black man in the South, is also justice to him in the North. To have receded from their position at the South, would have been political lestruction. Not to have advanced to the same position at the North, would have been political stultification and annihilation. They sprung forward-Connecticut did not like the hought of mixing white and black blood at home, and rejected the party. California saw the necessary results which would flow from the triumph of the theories of Radicalism, and cast her vote in favor of the Constitution of the United States. Whether the Radicals are to be defeated in the great States of Pennsylvania, New York and Ohio, cannot be stated with certainty. The Radicals do not themselves disguise that they are weaker than they were. SIMEON CAMERON, one of the shrowdest of American politicians, declares that Philadelphia is lost to the party. They will refuse to be ratisfied by another sensation story, and they will seek their rights,


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
