several years had pastoral charge of Trinity, and then of Bethel Methodist Church. He afterward was President of the Spartanburg Female College. Immediately after its close he took orders in the Protestant Episcopal Church, and at the time of his deat! was Rector in Houston, Texas.

Dr. Cross was a man of large talent and high

culture. He was profoundly versed in theolog and well road in the entire department of belles lettres. Able as an orator, and sometimes brilant, he was more pleasing to the intellectual man than to the uninformed masses. He had studied rhetoric as a science and practised it as an art. His sentence never was faulty, and his thought, gorgeously clad, always impressed the mind of the Ho was a voluminous writer, and his books.

while giving ovidence of but little originality, always bore testimony of putient industry, applied debility, loss of appetite, headache, torpor of the live by a mind capable of appreciating in and culling from others all that is good. Notwithstanding all the gifts with which boun-

ous nature had endowed him, he canuet be said to have been to any considerable degree a suc-cessful man; and care and trouble seem to have seen his constant companions through life.

THE MORRIS STREET FREE COLORED SCHOOL, This building, which was occupied for nearly two years by the Freedmen's Bureau as a school for the colored children of the city, was recently surrencotored condere of the city, was recently surren-dered to the Board of Commissioners. On the re-organization of the Public Schools, among other changes it was determined to devote the Morris Street School House to the tuition of the colored children. Tae school was opened for this purpose last week, and though the attendance was alim on the first day, it has since steadily increas-ed, and there are now nearly four hundred pupils enrolled, while others are received daily. Since the reoccupation of the school by the Board it has

been thoroughly refitted, and is now the best and most complete school building in the city.

The Board have spared no pains to bring the Morris Street School to perfection. The services of an experienced corps of teachers have been obtained, and the facilities for both the intellectual and physical culture of the pupils are unequalled by any school in the city. The bestion of this chart. any school in the city. The location of this school renders it admirably suited for the purposes in tended, as the houses in the vicinity are occupied principally by colored persons. In the arrange-ment of the school, great care has been taken to render the pupils comfortable, and a large play ground on either side of the building affords ample epace for the recreation of the pupils during the

The first floor of the building is assigned to the Primary Department, where the colored children of both sexes are faught their A B Cs. A pinuo in this department discourses sweet sounds, while the voices of the children unite in singing the hymns, which are part of the exercises. The s

and third floors are assigned to the female and mal grammar departments. Attached to each story ar four comfortable class-rooms, well ventilated and furnished with stoves. Five classes can be easily managed by the teachers, as one remains in the large room, but on an emergency others could be added. The school has accommodations for 800 or 900 pupils, and though only a fraction of that number has been enrolled, yet the Board anticipate a full attendance in a short time. There are number of colored children in the city who do not attend any school, but spend their time in idleness. It is for these, equally with the more studious, that this free school was organized. The advantages

of a good education are now appreciated by the most ignorant, and we strongly usgo upon the colored citizens to send their children to some school. We do not wish to ignore the many other schools in the city, they are ably managed, other schools in the city, they are ably managed, and have schieved a great success, but none can equal that in Morris street in point of comfort and in the facilities offered for the bodily and mental culture of the scholars. The building was constructed for a schoolhouse, is well ventilated, and furnished with all of the modern appliances which are used in the Northern schools.

The system of tuition is one that has received the approbation of experienced teachers North and South, and pupils entrusted to the care of the Principal will receive every attention, and be enabled to secure an education that will fit them for future usefulness.

RULES DETERMINING THE JURISDICTION OF PRO-

CHARLESTON, S. C., Sept. 39, 1867. [CHRULAIL.]

Pending the establishment of rules for the government of Military Tribunals in this district, Prevost Courts will not exercise jurisdiction in any case when the question involves the title of land; now in any civil cause where the debt sued for, or the damage claimed, exceeds three hundred (\$380) dollars. In all cases where the smoont claimed, either as debt or damages, exceeds twenty-five (\$25) dollars, the defendant shall be entitled to ten (10) days' notice; and if it exceeds one hundred (\$100) dollars, he shall be entitled to fifteen (15) days' notice; but this right may be waived by the defendant, and the trial of the cause set for an earlier day upon his written consent thereto, which consent must appear on the record of the Court. 
