THE REOPENING OF THE FREE SCHOOLS, -The first Monday in October has long been the opening day of the Free Schools of this city, and at an early hour yesterday morning the streets in the vicinity of the different schools were alive with children anxious to recommence their studies and to have their names registered. During the vacation the Board of Commissioners have perfected several changes in the organization of the schools. We have already alinded to the Morris street School, which has been set apart for the education of the colored children, and which has steadily increased in favor since it was organized. Fifty additional pupils were enrolled yesterday, making the number registered nearly five hundred. This chool was opened two weeks ago, and is now in full operation. It is patronized extensively by the colored population, and will soon equal in popularity the private colored schools now in the city. THE NORMAL SCHOOL

has been changed into a girls' grammar school. where the higher branchos of the English language are taught; but select classes are to be formed where pupils can obtain the instruction that will fit them to become teachers. About four hundred pupils were registered yesterday, but the morning was principally occupied in arranging the classes and accustoming the scholars to the discipline of the school. The Commissioners have made arrangements for the accommodation of between five hundred and six hundred pupils, and should this number be accepted it will necessitate an election of two or more assistant teachers. At present the Principal, Vice Principal and five Assistants constitute the corps. In arranging the building it was found necessary to furnish new settees and other furniture for the Assembly Hall; the contract for portion of these was awarded to Mr. C. AL-BRECHT, in Wentworth street, near Pitt. Notwithstanding the comparatively short notice, these settees, &c., were furnished in ample time and reflect great credit upon the maker, while some articles of school furniture that were ordered from the North have failed to reach the city. The Normal, or more properly the High Grammar School, is under the control of the fol-

PRE-ADAMTE MAN .- We believe it is BUCKLE sho says that it is a well-established fact that thenever one man breaks a leg, or one woman has its, immediately afterward several other men will break their legs, and several other ladies have convulsions. This is called the law of coincidence. We were forcibly reminded of this the great law of chance vesterday afternoon, when we had the nonor of a visit to our sanctum from Prof. W. C. KERR, State Geologist of North Carolina, Dr. N. A. PRATT, Analytical Chemist, of this city, and Prof. FRANCIS S. HOLMES, of Charleston Coilege. The two former had been to Prof. Holanes' plantation esterday morning, near Ashley Ferry, about ten niles from this city, to examine the bed (postpleiocene deposit) we described at some length in our issue of Saturday. They were armed with the geologist's usual tools, pick and hammer, and went o work, and soon had reason to be more than satisfied with the reward of their labor. They found a piece of the bone (dorsal vertebra) of the mammath but this has long ceased to be an object of curiosity, so many of the remains of extinct animals having already been found in this bed. They kept on in their search, and presently saw on the sloping beach a jagged object projecting about one and a half inches from the sand. They began to dig, and soon unearthed, to their lelight and amazement, a human thigh bone, ontire with the exception of the lower articulation, The bone is sixteen inches in length; heavy mough to indicate petrifaction, yet not sufficient y so to lead us to suppose that it was entirely petrified. The cellular structure in the centre is in perfect preservation. The outer covering only would appear to have undergone petrifaction. Its general appearance in every respect is precisely similar to that of the fossil usually found in the post-pleiocene deposits. This femur was found a ow feet from the bone of the mammoth referred to above; and near it a small fragment (nine and a half inches long) of a human tibia, apparently beonging to the same period as the others we have nantioned. Professor Kern and Dr. Pratt also found a small piece of pottery, similar to several pieces in Professor Holmes' possession.

This is a very important discovery, and we do not wonder that Professor Holmes' enthusiasm is at fever heat. After looking for human bones in this bed for upwards of twenty-three years, it is singular these should have been found at last by others, who were there easually on a first visit Professor Holmes not being with them. As a curious coincidence, we may also refer to the fact of our having directed public attention to the subect only two days ago-in Saturday's News-and there having asked the question, Why human bones have not been discovered in a stratum giving so many other evidences of the presence of man? Scarcely was the init day, when the question received a signally brilliant and perfectly conincing answer in the femur discovered yesterday. We hope Professor Holmes will give his fears to the winds, and proceed at once to publish this imporiant discovery to the scientific world.
