We are requested by the State Tax Collector to remind delinquents of the quarterly State tax for quarter ending 30th September, 1867, that the books will be closed after to-morrow, the 15th inst., and that double tax executions will be issued against all who have failed to pay the tax on sales of spirituous liquors and goods, wares and merchandise, for the months of July, August and September.

DEATH OF T. P. ALLEN, Esq.-The Greenville Enterprise brings the sad intelligence of the death of Mr. Allen, which occurred at his residence, in that town, on Monday last. Mr. ALLEN was a New Englander by birth, but came to this city when quite young, and for many years conducted a school with great success. He subsequently became connected with the firm of McCarter & ALLEN, but had retired from business previous to the war, and purchased a farm near the city. During the war he removed to Greenville, S. C., and remained a citizen of that place until his death.

TAXATION OF RAILBOADS .- We obtain the following information from the Columbia Phoenix : Another very interesting case commenced yesterday evening, before Judge Moses. The point is the legality or constitutionality of the tax imposed by the last Legislature on the gross income of railroads. The Charlotte and South Carolina Railroad made their -return under the law, and made arrangements to pay the tax. The Greenville Railroad made its return, but did not pay the tax, and an execution to collect the tax was issued. The South Carolina Railroad made no return, and was double taxed, according to the provisions of the law, and an execution was issued therefor, upon which the latter corporation has presented a petition, praying for a prohibition against the collection of the tax. TRINITY CHURCH SABBATH SCHOOL.—The Sacred Concert advertised in Saturday's News passed off very pleasantly yesterday afternoon. The church was crowded, a large number of the little ones being present. One of the ladies connected with the school presided at the melodeon. The singing was excellent, the little songsters all joining with the spirit and with all their might.

In the absence of the Superintendent, Mr. SAMUEL A. NELSON, the Assistant Superinten dent, read the semi-annual report of the Trinity and Cumberland Sabbath Schools. From it we learn that the school was open twenty-three Sabbaths during the past six months. Average attendance of preachers twenty, and of scholars one hundred and seven; total one hundred and twenty seven. There have been fifty-four scholars admitted, and twenty-eight have withdrawn. No death has occurred in this school the past six months. Thirteen from the school have joined the church. The roll now consists of twenty-eight officers and teachers (fifteen males and thirteen females), and one hundred and eighty scholars (seventy-eight males and one hundred and two females); total two hundred and eight.

Since then the superior facilities afforded by the South Carolina Railroad at its termini have concentrated the trade at those points.

The merchants and business men of Aiken are now endeavoring to inaugurate a new era. And we understand that the gentlemanly agent of the South Carolina Failroad at Augusta, Mr. John E. MARLEY, has assured them that every facility for the transportation of cotton from Aiken will now be afforded by the Comnany. And further, that Mr. WALLACE, Collector of United States Internal Revenue for the 3d District, has appointed Mr. C. A. LATHROP as Receiver of the Internal Revenue tax on all cotton raised in his collection District Edgefield and Lexington which may be taken to

DEATH OF MR. JAMES PHYNNEY .- On Saturday the family of Mr. JAMES PHYNNEY, received a telegraphic dispatch from Richmond, announcing his death in that city on Friday, the 11th instant. Mr. PHYNNEY left this city some two weeks since and proceeded to Richmond, with a view to try the effects of a change of air on his health, which had been failing for some time. In the deease of Mr. PHYNNEY, the Printers of Charleston have lost one of the most estimable of their number. He will long be remembered for his quiet and unobtrusive manners. Mr. PHYNNY was a native of this city, and was in the fifty-second year of his age. We sympathize with his relatives in their bereavement.

AFFAIRS IN SOUTH CAROLINA .- A correspondent of the New York Times, writing from Charleston, on the 4th instant, says: "Along the seaboard general bankruptcy must ensue during the coming winter, unless creditors should prove vastly more enient than creditors usually are. Nearly every plantation is more or less mortgaged, and should forecloseures be insisted upon, the best lands in his State will change hands at a ruinous sacrifice. The lawyers are preparing to reap a rich harvest out of the cases under the new bankrupt law, for there will probably be no portion of the Union that will contain as large a number of insolvents, in proportion to the population, as South Carolina."

MUSTERIOUS DEATH .- On Saturday evening Coroner Whiting was notified of a death at Mun-PHY's Boarding House, that demanded an inquest. It appeared that Thos. NUGENT, a man about thirty-seven years of age, and from New York, had been boarding at MURPHY's, No. 2 Queen street, for two weeks. On Saturday afternoon about four o'clock, he came home and soon became rapidly sick. While he was lying on a sofa, apparently in a dving condition, a message was sent for the Rev. Mr. Yares, who instantly repaired to the boarding house, together with his son, Dr. Jo-SEPH A. YATES. Before their arrival, the man had died, and Mr. Yarks observing an undue haste manifested in the preparations for the burial, promptly notified the Coroner. Mr. WHITING WAS soon on the spot, and after impanneling a jury who viewed the body, they were discharged until Monday week, in order to allow Dr. YATES full time for a post mortem examination and a chemical analysis of the contents of the stomach, grave suspi ion being aroused by the suddenness of the death, the man having been seen well, hearty and sober at 2 o'clock the same day. He was supposed to have some \$1500 in his possession, but only \$150 could be satisfactorily accounted for The matter will be thoroughly investigated, and if any guilt is attached to his late associates, they will be speedily indicted for the crime.

THE FEAST OF TABERNACLES, -OR "SUCCOTH." This is the first day of the Festival of Huts, and for the information of our non-Israelite readers, we proceed to give a description of it, copied from the source to which we have been indebted on several previous occasions. Chambers says: On the evening of the 14th day of Tishri, the Feast of Tabernacles, commences. (Lev. xxiii. 42.) The | world. interval between the Day of Atonement and this festival is employed in preparations for this festive period. Each family fits up some roomespecially built for this purpose-for a booth, or erects one in the courtyard or garden. The ungenial climate of the North, and the advanced season of the year (generally late in September). will not allow the Jew to make the 'th his regular dwelling-place during the festival; but he as least takes his meals in it. Another peculiarity this festival is the use of a branch of a palm-tree, of a willow, myrtle, and citron. It is these which, according to tradition, are meant by Leviticus xxiii. 40. The willow branch and the myrtle are tied to the lower part of the bough of the palmtree, but the citron is kept separate; and it is the duty of every congregation to provide these re quisites for the use of the members. There are however, few religious Jews who, if they can afford it, do not procure them for their private the occasion is pronounced, and the branch slightly shaken. This ceremony is gone through every morning during the seven days of the festival, and by each individual separately. No Jew would taste food before the performance of this rite.

The eighth day should properly so conclude the festival; but rabbinical authority has added a ninth, under the title of 'Rejoicing with the Law. This, as its name betokens, is a day of great merriment, in which even the greatest rabbis-of course in their own way-take part, expressive of their delight in, and attachment to the law, the synagogue: for the Pentateuch is divided into each Sabbath, beginning with that following this festival, its respective portion is read, so that the whole cycle is completed on the Sabbath before, or rather, as established by custom, on that festival. Leave Charleston for Augusta. The synagogues on this occasion exhibit scenes of extraordinary bustle, and not rarely also of upcoarious joy. In the evening the places of worship are crowded, and the boys are seen entering with little gaily-painted banners and wax tapers in their hands. The synagogues are most sump tuously lighted; and before the ark generally glitters a veil of very costly materials, not unfrequently gorgeously bedecked with pearls and precions stones.

After a short service the veil is drawn back, the ark opened, and the scrolls of the Law-covered with costly stuffs, and occasionally also with plates of precious metal-are solemnly banded by the beadle to various persons summoned by name to the ark for that purpose. This done, a portable canopy, carried by several youths, is extended over the minister and wardens, who, with the scrolls in their hands, head a solemn procession, which is joined by all other bearers of scrolls, the youth, and the little boys, the latter holding in their hands the banners alluded to, at the tops of which lighted wax tapers are fastened, all chauting hymns in praise of the Law.




