The Improvement of our Harbor - What

-The commerce of Savannah has suffered materially in consequence of the obstructions in the river channel; and, by the efforts of the Mayor and Council, its condition has been greatly improved. Much, however, remained to be done, and, in October last, Mayor Anderson wrote on the subject to the Secretary of the Treasury in Washington, sending a communication from the Commissioners of Pilotage, and a private letter from Admiral Shubrick, earnestly requesting that the applica-tion might receive favorable consideration. The Mayor said it was necessary that an accurate survey of the bed of the river should be made, showing the changes caused by the sinking of impediments and the consequent set and velocity of the tides; and requested that a hydrographical party be sent from the United States Coast Survey to operate with the city authorities in the improvement of the river. In reply, the Mayor has received a letter from Admiral Shubrick, in which he says that the Secretary has given the necessary instructions to have the harbor of Savannah surveyed with a view to its being properly lighted; and that it will be the duty and pleasure of the Board to provide all necessary aids to navigation. It is accordingly expected that the arrival of the surveying party will soon be announced.

In noticing the efforts of our neighbors of Savannah to improve their harbor entrance, and to facilitate commercial intercourse with the world, it has struck us that if our leading business men would, in the form of petition, or by any other means that might seem advisable, endeavor to procure similar aid from Washington, that our ef- be remembered. forts might at least bring us such assistance as would relieve our most urgent demands. The Freedmen's Bureau.

REPORT OF GENERAL HOWARD-PARTIAL DISCONTIN UANCE OF THE BUREAU RECOMMENDED. General Howard, Commissioner of the Freedmen's Bureau, has completed his annual report,

and laid it before the Secretary of War. The most important recommendation is that the Bureau be discontinued as a separate institution in July next, when the law expires. Respecting the unsettled claims for back pay and bounty, the commissioner recommends, however, a continuance of the division in connection with the War Department as long as it shall be deemed necessary for the completion of the work committed to its charge. In this connection, General Howard remarks that it may seem hazardous to withdraw this burgan agency so soon, though he bases the practicable, after the committed to the control of th

The commissioner says that twenty-eight civil agents have been discharged and forly-eight vol-unteer officers mustered out. He notices the unteer officers mustered out. He notices the working of the reconstruction acts, and says their effect has been good, and that the freedmen, as a people, are making rapid progress in education, science, arts and all branches of industry. The amount of abandoned lands in possession of the bureau is 215 024 acres, and the number of pieces of town property is 359. A large part of the abandoned land is of a swampy character and scarcely any of it yields revenue. The greater proportion of it is merely in the nominal postession of the bureau, and would, ere this, have been turned over to former owners under the law had they made application therefor. General Howard makes coveral suggestions with reference to the indigent freedapplication therefor. General Howard makes coveral suggestions with reference to the indigent freedmen in the District of Columbia. He says that for a few years past appropriations have been needed and have been made for the relief of certain classes, such as the aged, the young children, the maimed, the insane, &c. In addition, there is a large class of people who are very poor, who have femilies to support and who are accustomed to families to support, and who are accustomed to receive aid, either directly or indirectly, from this relief fund. The Commissioner says it seems to him the best plan that could be proposed, instead of large relief appropriations, to ask Congress to open up all the avenues and improve the public grounds as far as the city has extended, making the necessary appropriations therefor. This would give a great deal of work through which the means of sustaining the families of the poor would be deived and at the same time it would carry on to completion the necessary improvements to be made by the general government at the capital. The commissioner also thinks that a reformato-The commissioner also thinks that a reformatory institution for children, without distinction of race, similar to those in New York and Boston, is much needed in the District. One is already in existence, but is confined to those convicted of crime. A large class of mischievous boys, who are a positive injury to the schools, and who are falling into idle and vicious habits, could be reclaimed and rendered a blessing to themselves and society by being sent to one of these well conducted schools. He recommends this subject for the consideration of Congress.

The amount of claims of colored soldiers collected by the bureau has been \$64,494 during the year.

The average number of rations issued during the year ending 1st of September was 11,655 per day. The total amount of supplies furnished we \$50,400 pounds of tacon and pork, and 6,809,800 pands of corn. 
