When such small troubles as the resuscitation of the South, the payment of the national debt, the development of the negro into an industrious worker, and the reconciliation of interest of North, East, South and West are accomplished, the grand Government of the United States-whether Republican or Monarchial-will begin in earnest that territorial expansion, which is not to stop until the same rule is acknowledged from the North Pole to Cape Horn. The United States are to have two hundred millions of inhabitants, varying in color from the bleached American to the swarthy African, and enlivened by the copper tint of the savage, and ne yellow skin of the Chinese laborer. This future is as tremendous as a belief that the sun may be extinguished by a steam fire engine; and is, to the full, as certain to be realized. But, whatever the stability of our "castles in America," our torn, distracted and jumbled up South American neighbors must be neither overlooked nor forgotten. They are rehearsing the bloody deeds of the Kilkenny cats; and, when they have left naught but a tale behind them, it will be pleasant to look at their condition as it appeared in the year of Grace 1867.

PERU. - Military assassinations are the order of the day, and cloaks and stilettoes the order of the night. Panic reigns, and the malcontents emulate the deeds of CORALES MELGAR, who killed seven officers with his own bloody hand. In Puno the gendarmes revolted, killed all their officers, and then, with slashed stockings, feathered hats, and watches and chains innumerable, began a jolly life as pillaging, murdering bandits. In Trujello the troops silled the Prefect, and installed in his place s pettifogging lawyer, who at once issued a proclamation of death against concealers of arms and absentee officers. Fortification, Firearms, and Fighting are the watchwords of the time, and the whole State is rapidly going to the dogs.

CENTRAL AMERICA .- In Costa Rica, an attempted revolution has "come to grief." In Salvador, the Government is improving the roads, and importing machinery, and the import of indigo has commenced. Nioaragua has concluded a treaty with the United States.

ECUADOR .- There has been a quarrel between President and Congress. In September The turmoil caused by Garibaldi's recent move- several Congressmen were arrested by the President on suspicion of being engaged in revolution. This was condemned by the Legislature, which formed a Judiciary Committee, and recommended the impeachment of the President, and that the session be declared permanent. The Executive sent a body of troops into the capitol, but afterwards withdrew them. Then, a Committee of Conference was appointed, the President gave in, the obnoxious Home Secretary Bustamente sent in his resignation, the imprisoned Congressmen were released, and the political horizon of Ecuador was clear once more. This little State has a population of about half a million; the United States has sixty times as much; yet something may be learned from an insignificant neighbor, and Eucador may have been the straw to show which way the winds will blow, in the big-domed Capitol at Washington.

Help for Reaction. The negroes have now, through their leaders, spoken out, and spoken plainly. Where they have had most latitude, they have been most violent; and, while such hot-headed knaves as the Richmond negro Lindsey may not represent the wishes of the more respectable of the colored people, they do carry influence enough to win applause for their harangues, and to secure to themselves a consolidated negro vote. They proclaim, without hestation, their demands of white disfranchisement and land confiscation; and, as in the case of the Alabama Convention, show their desire to upset every established principle, and to destroy the basis of the title to every description of property. On their part, any moderation is as rare as a black tulip or bifurcated lizard; and, without accomplishing any good for themselves, they have succeeded in driving their Radical white brethren from their noisy councils, and in turning against negro power the former organs of the Southern White Radical party. This is the work they have done; this

is the dark side of the tableau of Reconstruc-On the other hand, the Southern whitessubject to all possible provocation, and not even free from negro insolence-have acted with rare and heroic moderation. They have set their faces against clamor, violence, sedition, and rioting. Again and again have they told the colored people that the South would not return them to slavery if it could-that it desired to give them, and secure to them, all necessary protection; and that the schemes of the North ern Radicals could but end in final negro ruin. They have explained to the colored people the duties and responsibilities of their new position. and have over refrained from any attempt at coercion or intimidation. The Southern white man did not desire to revenge himself upon his former slave; and, when the negro became idle, reckless, and insubordinate, his former master regarded him with an indulgent eye, and laid the whole wast responsibility where it belonged-at the feet of the Radical party. No circumstance has been allowed to force the white man from his usual calm. Knowledge and experience taught him that the end would come; and, unflinchingly, he has awaited the day when liberty should be something more COOKING AND HEATING than a black abstraction. As a consideration for the merging of this property, the city undertook to make good any deficiency in the College revenues; and, under that agreement, the College has, from time to time, received some assistance.

The College is now the owner of abou \$160,000 of city stock; and, had the interest upon that stock been paid by the city, it is expected that its Trustees would have been able to meet their expenses. But this was not done; and, because of the inability of the city to pay the interest upon its debt, the Co lege has required help. In this matter of the city stock, the College is in the position of an ordinary creditor; but it seems certain that, under the obligation referred to, the city is bound to furnish funds to the College to the extent of the difference between income and actual expenses.
