STRENGTH OF THE ANNUAL MESSAGE OF THE PRESIDENT TO CONGRESS.

General CANBY, exercising the legislative authority vested in him by the military act of Congress, has issued the long expected order regulating taxation to support the expenses of the State organization of South Carolina during the current year.

The chief feature of interest in the order is that it provides expressly for a general reassessment of the property, in town and country, throughout the State. This reassessment is to be made without reference to any previous assessment, and is to be based upon the actual market value of the property, taking into account all the improvements which have been made, enhancing the value of land.

The effect of this provision will be to relieve the City of Charleston from the burden which she has so long borne, owing to the singularly partial manner in which the State assessments have hitherto been adjusted, and which imposed upon her citizens an undue proportion of the whole tax collected.

It will be seen that half the tax is made payable on or before March 31, 1868. This will bring up the value of the State bills receivable to nearly par, as they will be as available as greenbacks for the purposes of taxpayers.

Some persons who call themselves friends of the South give four reasons why the Southern States should be allowed to return into the Union. They say that it will lighten the burden of taxes to the North; that it will give the North strength in case of a foreign war; that it will gratify the feelings of the patriotic men of the North. In reply, four other reasons might be given on the part of the South—that the Southern are most interested in lightening their own burdens; that the South does not want any war with anybody on any terms; that the South prefers to keep its trade in Southern cities; that it does not care to gratify the feelings of patriotic men.

The Chinese Empire appears to be in a more than ordinary disturbed condition.
