Some persons who call themselves friends of the South give four reasons why the Southern States should be allowed to return into the Union. They say that it will lighten the burden of taxes to the North,-that it will give the North again the Southern trade,-that it will give the North strength in case of a foreign war,-that it will gratify the feelings of throughout the State, died in that city on Sunday the patriotic men of the North. # PHILADELPHIA UNIVERSITY MEDICINE AND SURGERY.

THE PHILADELPHIA UNIVERSITY OF MEDICINE THE PHILADELPHIA UNIVERSITY OF MEDICINE AND SURGERY was organized in 1848. Chartered by the Legislature, February 26, 1853. Name changed by a legislature enactment to the Eclectic Ledical College, or Philadelphia, in 1850. In 1853 is purenased the Pennsylvania Medical College, es ablished in 1542, and the Philadelphia Medical College, which had previously been merged into the Pennsylvania Medical University. The 1864 it purchased the Penn Medical University. The Trustees of the Sequarto schools united perflored and 1864 it purchased the Penn Medical Uniwrsi y. The Trustees of the separate schools united, pesitioned and obtained a special Act of the Legis ature, consolidating these institutions and challing their names to that of the Padladelphia University of Medicane and Surgery, anrich 15, 1865. All these various Acts are published in the statutes of Pennsylvania. The cost of the fullding and museum was over one hundred thousand dollars. It will be observed that the University, as now organized, is the legisl representative of the four Accident Colleges that it has absorbed. It is a liberal school of medicine, confined to no dogma, nor attached to any medical cliques, but embraces in its teaching everything of value to the profession.




