"Be it enacted that so much of the several acts relating to reconstruction, as required a majority of the registered voters to determine any election, or the ratifications of constitutions framed by conventions, elected under the present provisions of said acts, is hereby repealed; and at any election which has been, or may hereafter be held, for conventions or ratifications of constitutions, framed thereby, a majority of the votes cast at such elections shall determine the result."

The Committee of Ways and Means, in pushing through a repeal of the cotton tax in a shape which can get no relief until next year, is regarded as absurd. The friends of the South are intensely indignant at this perversion, as they claim, of the generous views of the Northern people as expressed at the polls.
