The treaty under which this excessive expenditure is made, however, expires in January, and the Postmaster-General has advertised for proposals to carry the mails during 1868. Twelve cents in gold for each letter has heretofore been paid for the mail service to Great Britain, but by new contracts resulting from the above proposals, during 1868 the toroign letter mails will be carried at fifteen couts an ounce, making the cost per letter five cents, and books, papers and other printed matter, at six cents per pound, payable in currency. # Postal Telegrams.

The idea of impressing the telegraph into the service of the Postoffice, to send the people's letters over the wires, or rather to do away altogether with letters, and communicate with friends, kinsfolk, banker, broker, customer, and dun, solely by means of a galvanic battery, is not altogether new. It has been broached from time to time, both in this country and on the continent of Europe. During the late war Holland which no horse or carriage has ever been the telegraph, to all intents and purposes, throughout the United States, was under the control of the government. The cable tells us that the English Government has resolved to adopt the telegraph as a part of its postal machinery.
