MEDICINE AND SURGERY.

THE PHILADELPHIA UNIVERSITY OF MEDICINE AND SURGERY was organized in 1848. Chartered by the Legislature, February 26, 1853, Manne changed by a legislative enactment to the Eclectic hedical College, of Philadelphia, in 1860. In 1863 it purchased the Pennsylvania Medical College, established in 1542, and the Philad 2-phis Medical College, which had previously been merged into the Pennsylvania Medical University. The Trustees of the separate schools united, politioned and obtained a special Act of the Legislature, consolidating these institutions and chas ging their names to that of the Philadelphia University of Medicine and Surgery, March 15, 1865. All these various Acts are published in the statutes of Pennsylvania. The cost of the luilding and museum was over one hundred thousand dollars. It will be observed that the University, as now organized, is the legal representative of the four Medical Colleges that it has absorbed. It is a liberal school of medicine, confined to no dogma, nor attached to any medical cliques, but any process the treating everything of value to the dogma, nor attached to any medical cliques, but embraces in its teaching everything of value to the

profession.
Sessions.—It has two full sessions each year, conprofessions.—It has two full sessions each year, commencing on the 1st of October, and continuing until the 1st of January, as its first session, and from the 1st of January to the 1st of April, as its second; the two constituting one full course of lectures. It has also a summer session, commencing the 1st April and continuing until August, for the preparatory branches, such as Latin, Greek, Mathematics, Bottony, Zeology, Chemistry, Anatomy, Physiology, etc.

Tickets.—Tickets to the full course of lectures \$1:0 or \$60 for each seasion. For the summer or preparatory course \$25. Graudsting fee \$30. To aid young men or moderate means, the University has issued five hundred scholarships, which are sold to first-course students for \$75, and to second-course students and clergymen for \$50, each constituting the holder a life member, with the perpetual privileges of the lectures, and all the teachings of the school. The only additional fees are a yearly dissecting and matriculating tecket, each of which is \$5.

The Advantages of Scholarships.—The student hold-

Students, by holding scholarships, can prosecute other business a part of the time.

The candidate for graduation can present himself at any time, and receive his degree as soon as qualified.

In case a student should hold a scholarship and not be able to attend lectures, it can be transferred to another, thus preventing any loss.

Parents, guardians or trunds of students wishing to purchase scholarship for them a year or more before their attendance at the University, can secare them by advancing one-half the price and paying the balance when the student enters. Physicians and benevolent men can bestow great benefit upon poor young men by presenting them a scholarship, and thus enabling them to obtain an honorable procession. seion.

The Faculty embraces seventeen eminent physi-

The Faculty embraces seventeen eminent physicals and surgeons. The University has associated with it a large hospital clinic, where every form of medical and surgical disease is operated on and treated in the presence of the class.

COLLEGE BUILDING.—The College building, located in Muth-street, south of Walnut, is the finest in the city. Its front is collegiate gothic, and is adorted with embattlements and embrasures presenting a novel, bold, and beautiful appearance. The fracade is of brown stone, ornarpented by two towers, raing to the elevation of eighty feet, and crowned with an embattled parapet. The building contains between fifty and sixty rooms, all supplied with water, gas, and every other convenience that modern improvement can contribute to facilitate medical instruction.
