There is no safety for us except in parcelling out ten States of the Union into military districts and consigning them to the crude legislation of carpet-bag conventions." The National Banks.

The bill reported by the Senate Finance Committee, amendatory of the present bankthe fact that the eccentric ceintures, or wide ing law, provides, among other things, that the honds deposited by the national banks to secure the redemption of their notes shall exceed the circulation by twenty-five per cent., instead of ten per cent., as heretofore.
