> THE SHIP JAMES A. WRIGHT .- The heaving down of this ship was successfully performed yesterday, at the ship-yard of the Messrs. Marsh, by the rigger, Mr. John Torrent, and the Messrs. Marsh. A BILL TO AMEND THE FIRST SECTION OF AN OHDENANCE TO PREVENT THE FILLING UP OF

OHDINANCE TO PREVENT THE FILLING UP OF LOTS WITH CERTAIN MATERIALS, RATIFIED JANUARY 18, 1859.

Be it ordained by the Mayor and Aldermen in City Council assembled, That, hereafter, it shall not be lawful for any person or persons, or body politic, to fill up any low lots or low lands within the city with rice chaff, sawdust, or a fial of any description, except during the montas of December, January and February, except such lot or lots as may be covered by the tides, under a penalty of twenty dollars for each and every offence; and, also, a further ponalty of twenty dollars for each and every day that such prohibited materials shall lie or be permitted to prohibited materials shall lie or be permitted to remain on any such low lot or low land, after twenty-four hours' notice from the Mayor, City Inspector, or City Registrar to remove the same. And one-half of the first named penalty shall go to the informer in each case.
