AN ORDINANCE TO RAISE SUPPLIES FOR THE YEAR ONE EIGHT AND SIXTY EIGHT.

Section 1. Be it ordained by the Mayor and Aldermen in City Council assembled, that a tax for the sum of one hundred and fifty thousand dollars be and is hereby levied and paid into the Treasury of the City, for the use and service thereof, that is to say: Two dollars on every building, lot, wharf, or other landed estate, including every building and improvement on lands owned or used by any person, firm, or corporation, for religious, charitable, or literary society, or any other building, lease, payable in three periods, viz: March, July, and October, 1868, in equal parts.
