The Free Schools of Charleston—Their Past, Present and Future.

The free schools of Charleston will compare favorably, in every respect, with those of most Northern cities, and they confer credit both upon the State and upon the individual who inaugurated the present excellent system.

Under the old regime the free schools in the city were generally located in dark and narrow lanes or in some almost inaccessible place. For many years one of these schools held its sessions in a house built on piles in the marsh at the eastern boundary of the city.

The average attendance in all of the schools last month was seventy-six per cent; in the white schools seventy-nine per cent, and in the colored eighty-eight per cent. This low average was caused by the number of rainy days in February, when only a few scholars were present.
