From the final decision of any judge, justice or court, inferior to the Circuit Court, an appeal may be taken to the Circuit Court of the United States for the district in which said cause is heard, and from the judgment of said Circuit Court to the Supreme Court of the United States, on such terms and under such regulations and orders, as well for the custody and appearance of the persons alleged to be restrained of his or her liberty, as for sending up to the appellate tribunal a transcript of the petition, writ of habeas corpus, return thereto, and other proceedings as may be prescribed by the Supreme Court, or, in default of such, as the judge hearing said cause may prescribe.
