Of the sales 2000 bales were to one buyer for Liverpool. The opinion gains ground that the supply from India will be short of the estimates considerably. On the other hand, it is believed that spinners in the Middle and Northern States have secured fully 100,000 bales overland, beyond what has been reported at points of destination.

A larger business has been done on speculation here this year than perhaps ever before on so small a supply. The reported sales since the first of February are 27,000 bales above receipts, after allowing for difference of stock. The actual resales are, perhaps, more than Jouble that amount.


